## **MARCH MEETING**

### **Recycling: More Valuable the Second Time Around**

The March meeting of the Barcroft School and Civic League will focus on recycling. Ned Ruhe of Arlingtonians for a Clean Environment will be there to inform us of the latest innovations in recycling, present ideas on how to become more involved in this effort, and tell us the reasons we should care. Look for some "quick bytes" on recycling elsewhere in this issue.

## **Arlington County Recycling Program Update**

The recycling center on Columbia Pike has proven so popular on weekends that officials are asking residents to try to drop off recyclables during the week when possible to help avoid overflowing containers and reduce traffic congestion. Residents should also consider using the center at 500 S. 31st St. in Crystal City.

The pilot curbside recycling pickup service began February 25. Know anybody who is participating?

## **Park Clean-Up Time**

The County's annual Clean-Up Day for Four Mile Run is Saturday, March 9. The BSCL has adopted the section of streambed from Columbia Pike to 9th St. S., which has been thoroughly trashed by the vagrants living in the park. The County has begun the cleanup, but a lot is left to be done. You can see the target area from the Safeway parking lot, but the only safe way to clean it up is with a group. If enough Barcrofters show up, we can broaden our scope to sweep the rest of the park we have been working on.

We will meet at the bridge on Columbia Pike at 9 AM. Wear workgloves, and bring a rake or shovel if you want to. If you have waterproof boots, they may prove useful when cleaning up the streambed. Most of the trash, however, is on the bank. We will have trash bags and will recycle the glass, cans, and plastic we find. If the County has not been able to cut the weeds by machine, some of us will come equipped to do that by hand.

Our last park cleanup was great fun for all, and the results were very satisfying. Come join your neighbors to do some good. For last-minute info or if the weather is bad, call the Neighborline at 521-1116 for an update.



## It's Trout Fishing Season Once Again

Rainbow and brook trout will be running in Four Mile Run Stream from Bon Air Park to Barcroft Park. The season officially opens at 9 AM March 16, after which the hours are from sunrise to sunset. On opening day, Bon Air Park above Wilson Boulevard will be restricted for children aged 15 and under. Volunteers from the Northern Virginia Chapter of Trout Unlimited will be on hand in Bon Air Park at the picnic shelter and rose garden to instruct and help the children. A fly casting demonstration will be conducted from 12 to 12:30 pm in the field next to the Bon Air Park comfort station.

State fishing regulations will be enforced. Virginia residents aged 16-65 are required to obtain a Virginia fishing license; nonresidents must purchase either a nonresident fishing license or a five-day trip license. Senior citizens born after June 30, 1923, are required to purchase a \$1.00 annual fishing license. A state trout license is **not** required to fish for trout in Arlington County.

Minimum size is 7 inches. Creel limit is 6 fish per day per person. Dip netting is **not** permitted. For more information, read the 1991-1992 Virginia Fishing Regulations, available where licenses are sold. For current information, call the Arlington County Trout Fishing Hotline, 358-4400.

will assume it was intentional and will not add it.

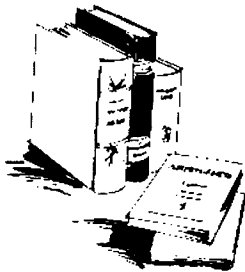

- ♻ Recycling 75,000 pounds of paper saves about 640 trees, 902,400 gallons of water, 8,460 kilowatt-hours, and 124 cubic yards of landfill.
- ♻ A ton of recycled newsprint saves 17 trees and can be recycled 5-8 times.
- ♻ Making new paper from old paper uses 30-50% less energy than making it from trees.
- ♻ Paper produced through recycling reduces air pollution by 74% and water pollution by 35%.

## Applications Available for 1991 Real Estate Tax Relief Program

Arlington County homeowners aged 65 or older and certain disabled persons may be eligible for deferral of or partial exemption from the real estate tax. You are eligible for deferral if the gross combined household income in 1990 did not exceed \$40,000, or for partial exemption, \$20,000. In addition, the combined financial worth of the household, excluding the value of the home, may not exceed \$150,000 for deferral and \$75,000 for partial exemption. The application deadline is Aug. 15, but for timely deferral or exemption credit on the first installment of the tax bill, **applications must be received by Mar. 15.**

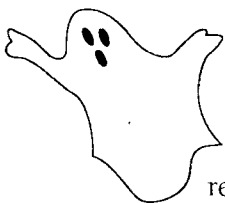

# Arlington's Best Kept Secrets

## Ghosts in the Tube

Have you ever wondered why you get those ghostly ghosts on your TV? They are the result of a repeat of the original signal from the transmitter. The second signal is weaker than the first, making it fainter. It usually bounces off of a tall building and reaches your set a fraction of a second later than the original signal. Since the TV scans from left to right, the ghost is always to the right of the original image. A similar double signal causes poor FM radio reception.



It's not hard to find the culprits responsible for messing up Barcroft's TV and radio reception. Some are located along Route 7, just over the County line, between Bailey's Crossroads and Shirley Highway. The others are behind Safeway. Residents of these buildings should be taxed to pay for the environmental pollution they cause, but that would probably mean connecting all of our homes to cable.

Aside from cable, the only way to cure ghosts at present is with a very good—and expensive—outdoor antenna with a high front to back ratio for good rejection of ghosts. Eventually digital televisions will be available that will automatically reject the ghost image, but that won't be for several years. Barcrofter Jim Kerr adver-

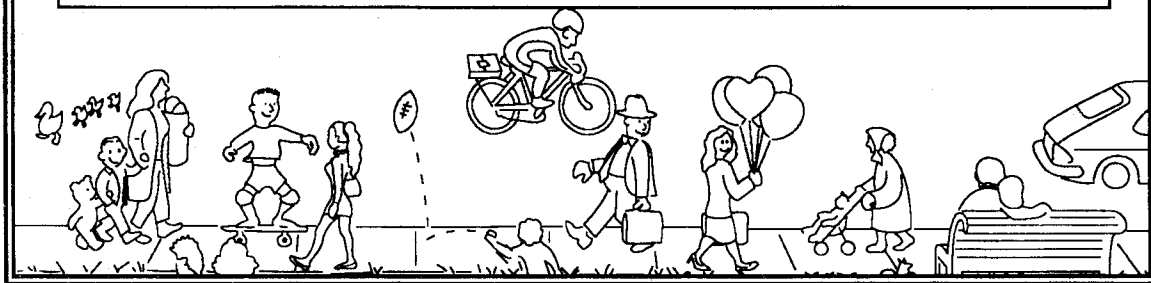

## Around the Neighborhood With Kathy Kerr



After reading the last issue of the *Barcroft News*, I decided to volunteer some time to distribute food to our neighbors through the "Lazarus at the Gate" program. But what would I do with my kids while I was doing that? Suddenly it occurred to me to simply take them along!

Four-year-old Caroline slept through it all in her carseat; but seven-year-old Allen was a tremendous helper. He carried boxes of food and loaded them into the cars. At the two food distribution stops, Allen passed out cans of food while other volunteers handed out bread, peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, and the small amount of milk and fruit available. Laurie Kelsch reported that it was the first time in weeks that they hadn't run out of food to give away at the Hardees parking lot stop.

Most of the other volunteers that night were teenagers, including Barcrofters Danny Kelsch and Brian Zopf. Some 8th graders from the Kelsches' church helped too—Shawn Northrup, Jinhina Rodriguez (as translator), and Sandra Rojas. Laurie also brought her daughters—Katie, 3½, and Mary, 2.

At least six more neighbors have also volunteered their time, two hours per month.

If you want to help but cannot donate time, nonperishable food items are the easiest to donate. Lazarus also has a freezer, a walk-in cooler, and a very fast turnover rate for perishable foods. Clothing and toys are also distributed. Volunteer food deliverers are always needed, as are sandwich makers. It is possible that sand-

wiches could be made in your home if finding a sitter is difficult.

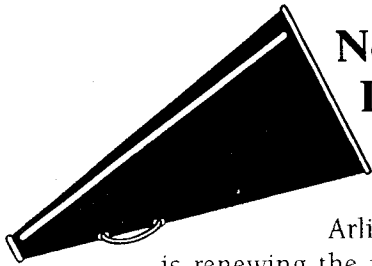

Arlington County is renewing the use permit for Pizza Hut's takeout/delivery shop in the Barcroft Shopping Center. I related the following wreckless driving incident.

An impetuous Pizza Hut driver crossed the double yellow line on Buchanan to pass a car, threatening a bicyclist coming from the other direction. When confronted at Pizza Hut moments later, the driver arrogantly dismissed the complaint with, "Go on, call the police."

Can you give a normal young person a hot pizza to deliver before it cools and expect him or her to drive safely through our neighborhood? I think not. This driver, however, was returning for another order, not making a delivery. I instinctively react with fear when I see a pizza delivery car—fear for myself, and for anyone else out on the street in our neighborhood.

Personally, I have no intention of calling Pizza Hut or Dominos to bring this plague down on my neighbors who may be innocently walking or driving on a Barcroft street when a wild pizza car blasts through. You may say this is overreacting, or that your pizza is worth it—that's your decision. I might pick up a pizza at the carryout, or heat up a frozen one, or even (shudder) make one from scratch. I may even eat something else.

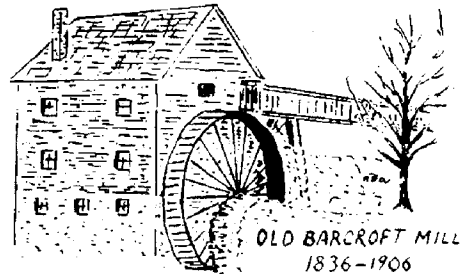

## Barcroft Votes

The special election in January produced interesting results in our precinct.

As always, our voting split was within 1% of the average for the 49th District as a whole: 54% (214 votes) for Karen Darner (D), 41% (162 votes) for Alice Tennies (R), and 4% (17 votes) for Richard Sincere (L). There were also 16 absentee ballots, for a total of 409 cast.

The big surprise this time was the turnout. The combination of apathy, cold, and snow kept many from voting, so the total 49th District turnout was only 14% of all registered voters. By contrast, about 25% of Barcroft's voters cast their ballots—a relatively heavy turnout. In an election with only 1,798 people voting, our neighborhood votes accounted for nearly one in four. Whether your candidate won or not, your vote was important for the neighborhood.

Karen Darner, who lives in our neighborhood on Buchanan Street and is a member of the BSCL, is now in Richmond for her first session of the House of Delegates. She was featured on the front page of the January 10th *Arlington Journal*.

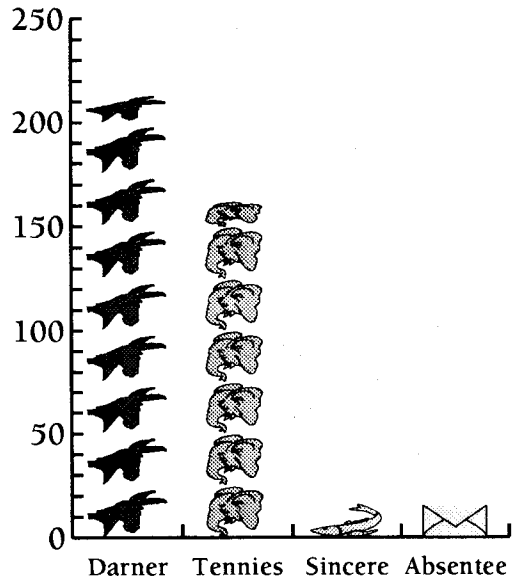

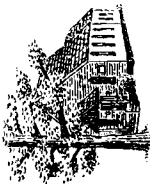

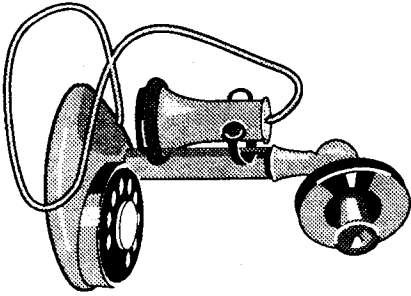
