County Approves Plans for Demeter; Resident Lawsuit is Threatened

On Saturday, Oct. 5 the County Board approved by a 3 to 2 vote the application by Vanguard Services to move an 18 person group home and residential treatment facility to a single family home on Sixth Street.

A group of Sixth Street residents is now exploring the possibilities of filing a lawsuit to try to stop Demeter House from opening. The group is in the beginning stages of raising money to fund legal expenses. Call Rocco Saracina at 920-0748 if you wish to help.

During the lengthy county hearing, it seemed to many Barcroft participants that the board's decision had been made in advance, including the cosmetic reduction of the number of residents from 22 to 18. Saracina requested the Board and Vanguard to assure the neighborhood that there would be a two year cap on bumping up the maximum number of residents, but each refused to do that, leaving no doubt about where the facility

is headed.

County Board member Chris Zimmerman, who with fellow member Paul Ferguson voted against the final decision, noted that he thought the neighborhood has reason to be dissatisfied with the way the County's process worked in this case.

In the wake of the meeting, some Barcrofters suggested making protest votes

Barcroft's spirit is alive and well today, thriving and throbbing with more and more active interested Barcrofters. Barcrofters meet the first Thursday every month September through June at 7:30 to give information, discuss and present

solutions to current and future concerns. And the first Tuesday of the month at Arlington Hospital delegates and citizens attend the Arlington County Civic Federation to bring our concerns, are informed and help with Arlington-wide concerns.

As well, activities take place such as the celebration of the 4th of July with its music, parade and picnic with its hello-you-all getting to know neighbors and their children. All this and more is why I like Barcroft.

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Barcroft School Posts Big Jump in Students

Barcroft Elementary School has seen an explosion of incoming students this fall. As of the second week of school, 104 students were enrolled in kindergarten, a jump that came as a surprise to school officials. The county expected 67 new kindergardeners this fall.

Two new teachers were hired and two additional kindergarten classes were opened up, bringing the total number of kindergarden classes to five.

Why the increase? More Barcroft parents are sending their children to the neighborhood school, said Principal Miriam Hughey-Guy.

Barcroft school's statistics, with first

the projected, and then the actual number enrolled, are as follows: Preschool, 8, 7; Kindergarten, 67, 104; 1st grade, 72, 85; 2nd grade, 66, 68; 3rd grade, 72, 76; 4th grade, 60, 62; 5th grade, 72, 76; Total enrollment, 435, 474.

Our polling place is at the rear of Barcroft School, 625 S. Wakefield. The polls are open 6 a.m. to 7 p.m.
