Egg Hunt to Take Place At Community House

A neighborhood-wide Easter Egg hunt will be held Saturday April 11, at 10 a.m. at the Barcroft Community House.

Any surplus would go to the Community House Restoration Fund. Construction may have started by the time you read this. Call David Michaelson at 553-3953 for further info on the project.



Tree Care Tips Include Mulch, Regular Water

About two dozen Barcrofters got tips on tree care from Kurt Mohr of Guardian Tree Experts at the March BSCL meeting. Guardian is the company that fertilized and pruned trees at the community house not too long ago. Mohr notes that the largest of our trees are perhaps 150 years old, and could live another 150 years with the right care. For those of you who couldn't attend, here are a few of his tips:

- Baby your tree. When it's hot and dry, water for one to two hours once a week.
- Spread a one- to two-inch layer of mulch around your tree. Ideally, mulch


should cover ground as far out as the drip line, an ideal impractical in many yards.

- Remove dead branches, which are

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a pathway for disease. Especially important for elms.

- Remove branches that rub against each other.

- Fertilize your tree once every two years in the fall. One way to do it: Drill 12-to 18-inch holes with an auger every three feet in a grid pattern and fill with granular fertilizer. You can even fertilize with compost, coffee grounds or banana peels if you use a 2-inch bit.

- Prune sucker growth.

- Remove ivy climbing up trees.

- Best time to trim: From late summer through about the beginning of March. But most companies can safely do it year-round.

Participants were Dave Cook, the Hollowell family, Jim Kerr, Sharon and Tom Tope, Randy Swart, Mark Wigfield. They picked up trash, cleared some downed trees and had a nice morning in the sun.

Major finds included a full Sunday edition of the Washington Post, an automotive grease gun (rusty outside but still working), one hubcap (Oldsmobile),

a brassiere (black, padded), a Christmas tree (still green!), some copper pipe (the only keeper), and lots of broken glass. Somebody who enjoys breaking glass has been lurking in Grandma's Creek, and it really complicates the cleanup.
