

On November 3 more than 38 percent of Barcroft precinct's active voters turned out, far more than the County's 23 percent average. Our County Board voting was close to the County average, with 38 percent for Christian Dorsey, 35 percent for Katie Crystol, 16 percent for Michael McMenamen and 10 percent for Audrey Clement. We voted 79 percent for Reid Goldstein for School Board, 79 percent for Patrick Hope for House of Delegates and 75 percent for Barbara Favola for State Senate.



Biking in Arlington

Arlington is a great place to bike and there are so many opportunities that are ready for you to use. One of the greatest is the Capital Bikeshare system. It allows you to take

out a bike and ride it for as long as you want and then just return it to one of their many pitstop stations. If the one that you would like to return it to is full, all you have to do is tell the machine that and it will give you

a fifteen minute chip to then return it to the next nearest station. You do have to pay for a membership for one day, three days, a month, bike. You can also just take out a bike for half

an hour and then return it for no charge. If you can try and figure out your route prior to your trip, then you will not have to pay for any bike time as you just trade your bike out for a new one and have that one for half an hour.

> Arlington also has many trails that can get you almost anywhere in the county. They also provide great scenic views of Arlington's forestry and parks. You can find a map of all the trails as well as on-road bike

lanes at Arlington County's bikearlington.com. You can also pickup a paper map at your local commuter or transit store. There is one at Shirlington and at the Ballston Metro.

road, always make sure that you use the provided bike lanes and always wear a helmet and use hand signals when turning. Be extra careful when biking on the sidewalk or street without bake lanes and remember that you have to share the road/sidewalk with other drivers and pedestrians. Also know that biking in bike lanes requires a car to give you at least three feet of space when passing you. Overall there are plenty of biking opportunities and you should take advantage of them while the weather still holds. •

MARKET UPDATE

In Arlington, Virginia for the month of October the median sold price for detached properties was \$845,000, up 12.3% from 9/15 and 7.4% from 10/14. The average days on market for units sold in October was 56 days, 16% above the 5-year October average of 48 days. Contract activity resulted in a Contract Ratio of 0.41 pendings per active listing, down from 0.42 in 9/15 and a decrease from 0.53 in 10/14. The Contract Ratio is 19% lower than the 5year October average of 0.50. A higher Contract Ratio signifies a relative increase in contract activity compared to supply, and indicates the market is moving in the seller's favor. A lower Contract Ratio signifies a relative decrease in contract activity compared to supply, and indicates the market is moving in the buyer's favor. Buyers have a historical advantage typically in the 4th quarter with less competition and more housing choices in most sectors of

the local market. So, if you are ready, <u>consider getting in the market to buy now instead of early</u> <u>spring</u>. You will have more choices and less competition, and you can lock in today's rates rather than risk rates increasing, which can impact monthly cash flow and one's ability to qualify. It's worth exploring your options now!
