Convenient Option: In-Person Absentee Voting

Do you find it difficult to get to the polls on Election Day?

Then Arlington County is there to help you. Starting on Friday, September 23, the county will begin to provide eligible residents with the ability to vote early—and in person—six days a week at one or more designated polling places created just for in-person "absentee" voters.

Contrary to what you might think, absentee voting is not just for military service members and students. In fact, there's a good chance you are eligible and don't even know it. All you need to do is affirm that you have one of 15 common reasons to vote absentee.

For example: Do you—like many local residents—work outside Arlington County? You qualify!

Or: Do you anticipate working and commuting 11 of the 13 hours polls are open? You qualify!

Moreover—as with the more well-known mail-in absentee voting op-

tion—eligibility for in-person absentee voting does not require you to be absolutely *sure* that you will not be able to make it to your local polling place November 8—only that it is *uncertain* whether you will be able make it there due to one of the 15 reasons.

Other acceptable reasons include the possibility of being absent for business or vacation, or being on duty as a first responder or active-duty military service member. You also can claim eligibility due to a disability or pregnancy, or if you care for a confined family member.

Finally, I have convened a committee to review and, where appropriate, update our bylaws, which were last revised in 1991. The committee consists of myself, Dedra Curteman, Keith Fred, Eric Harold, and Randy Swart. We will present our proposed revisions at a BSCL meeting in the new year.

Continued from page 1 ber of others, will qualify you to cast a mailedin or in-person absentee ballot in advance of the November 8 election.

The first in-person absentee voter polling station opens at Courthouse Plaza at 8 a.m., September 23, and will operate six days a week through November 5. For added convenience, you can complete your absentee ballot application right onsite before you vote.

Several weeks before the election, the county also will open two more polling places—one at Walter Reed Community Center, and another at Madison Community Center.

You can find exact dates and scheduled hours

of operation for all three polling places—as well as rules and information on early inperson absentee voting—at https://vote.arlingtonva.us/absentee/.

So remember, if you work outside Arlington County—or you have a long commute or work hours—you are eligible to cast an early, in-person absentee ballot.

Voting is your civic duty. And now it's so convenient you have no excuse not to do it.

(Just one last note: If you need to register to vote, or to change your voting address, you must do so by October 17. www.vote.virginia.gov). ●

Contemporary Artists Celebrated in Arlington

Bridging the community with contemporary art is key to Arlington Arts Center's (AAC) mission. To achieve this, AAC brings 14 regional contemporary artists to Arlington each year through its SOLOS series.

Earlier this year more than 100 artists living in the Mid-Atlantic Region submitted proposals to an open call for this semi-annual exhibition.

Jurors Sarah Newman, Independent Curator, and Jose Ruiz, Co-Director of Present Co. (NY), Director of Furthermore (DC), and Professor in the Curatorial Practice MFA Program at Maryland Institute College of Art, recommended 14 applicants for inclusion in the 2016-17 edition of AAC's competitive SOLOS series.

Selections are based on a range of criteria including compatibility with AAC's mission of promoting new work by regional artists. Selected SOLOS artists present work in a variety of media including painting, sculpture, installation, photography, and

performance.

Aptly titled, SOLOS artists are assigned to one of AAC's seven main gallery spaces, where they each mount a self-curated and self-contained exhibition. Artists often incorporate AAC's unique building, which features bright, airy spaces and black box galleries for experimental works, into site-specific installations, resulting in a selection of never-before-seen exhibitions.

Fall SOLOS 2016 opens October 15 and will be on view through December 18, with an opening reception Saturday, October 15, 6 to 9 p.m. Spring SOLOS 2017 opens April 2017 with an opening reception April 8, 2017, 6 to 9 p.m.

Each exhibition will be accompanied by a gallery talk with the artists. The public is invited for a walking discussion and tour of each artists' exhibition, followed by a light reception. The Fall SOLOS Gallery Talk is scheduled for December 10, 2016, 1 to 4 p.m. •

Walk and Bike to School Day 2016 - October 5


Join kids and families around the globe by walking or biking to school on Walk and Bike to School Day 2016 – Wednesday, October 5! (Rain Date: October 12)

One Great Native Plant for Your Garden: Butterfly Weed

Butterfly Weed (Asclepias tuberosa) adds stunning color to the summer garden. This easy-to-grow, drought tolerant plant grows one to three feet and produces brilliant yellow-orange to bright orange flowers throughout the summer. Butterfly Weed makes a delightful cut flower. Native Americans chewed the root as a cure for pleurisy and other lung ailments, resulting in its other common name, Pleurisy Root.

The plant is a nectar source for hummingbirds, butterflies, and other pollinators and a larval host for the Monarch Butterfly. Try planting Butterfly Weed with Black-eyed Susans and Gayfeather for a rainbow of colors during the hot summer months.

What Renovation Yields a 75% Return?

Remodeling Magazine's 2016 Cost vs. Value Report recently stated that a brand-new wooden deck added to your home will net you a 75% return on your investment when you decide to sell. This makes a deck renovation one that really pays off. Whether you want to build one from scratch or just want to expand on the one you currently have, here are some tips on how to get your deck on this summer that will pay you back down the road.

Before you start gathering your wood, hammers and nails, check out the amazingly useful free deck guide from the American Wood Council. Free expert advice is a huge asset before you get started. *Visit the blog article on our website for a link to the FREE guide.* This is also a good time to decide just how big you want to go -- a 200-square-foot deck will cost around \$4,836. The costs may not stop with the materials, and an addition could increase your property taxes and insurance rates. Get the hard numbers set beforehand to figure out your budget.

In general, a contractor will charge \$35 per square

foot to build a deck. The cost varies hugely when it comes to material though. Hollow-core PVC can cost as little as \$7.50 per square foot. Cedar can cost even less at \$3.50 and at the high end, Brazilian hardwood runs \$22 or more.

The best way to save money is to design your deck for the standard length of lumber: 6, 8, 10 or 12 foot boards. You can also buy secondhand wood from local salvage shops. Habitat for Humanity, for instance, sells reclaimed wood from demos. Not only might you score some unique hardwoods, but the savings can have a huge impact.
