Capital Bikeshare 101: The Big Red Bikes

You've seen them around town. You've watched riders navigate them on morning commutes. You may have used one to get across town. But, how did they start in our area and why?

As the first North American city to roll with the bikesharing concept, DC first offered SmartBike DC in 2008 as part of an advertising contract for its bus stops. But with just 120 bikes at 10 stations, ridership was very low and with no clause in the contract for expansion, the system closed in less than two years. Simulta-

neously, Arlington County was also developing the bikeshare concept reaching out to neighboring jurisdictions in an effort to get riders from point A to point B, similar to a bus or a train.

In 2010, Arlington and the District combined forces to make that idea a reality. After securing a system operator, the two jurisdictions successfully launched Capital Bikeshare on September 20, 2010. What started as 10-station system quickly expanded to present day's nearly 4,000

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
Dues News: Racing Toward the Finish Line

Also covered was the 49th District of Virginia's House of Delegates. Barcroft lies in the 47th District, where Delegate Patrick Hope is unopposed. Bikes for the World is a 501(c)(3) charity and provides a receipt good for tax purposes for all material and cash donations. BfW also accepts bike parts & accessories and operating portable sewing machines. 130,000 bicycles have been delivered to date.

Home prices in Northern Virginia continue to rise as low inventory levels and high demand have driven the median sales price to its new peak, pushing the median number of days that a home is on the market to a new low. Home price appreciation is pervasive in Northern Virginia although there is wide variation in home sale price by location & housing type.

The most expensive Zip codes are in the north end of the region. McLean's 22101 had the highest first-half 2017 sales price at just over \$1 million – nearly double the region median of \$508,888. Great Falls' 22066 and North Arlington's 22207 followed closely behind with sales prices just under \$1 million. The most affordable NVAR Zip codes are Falls Church's 22041, at the median price of \$266,000, Cameron Station's 22304 at \$365,000, and Braddock Heights' 22302, at \$349,450.

Many are curious if this is a new housing bubble

forming, leading to prices crashing as they did 10 year ago. The circumstances are different this time, as housing prices are not being pushed up by a "false demand" made possible by over-lending, but by a low supply. In the normal cycle of supply & demand, new, more affordable housing would be built, and prices would decline. In our local area, builders are not building affordable housing and existing owners of lower priced housing stock are not moving, some are expanding their homes with a desire to remain in their communities.

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
