## Neighborhood Conservation Project Updates

## By Deborah Wood, Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Committee Representative

Arlington County has hired a contractor to carry out the 7th Street South entrance to the W&OD trail project. By February 1, members of the NC Planning team will have met with the contractor to work through the schedule and details of construction, and the project will be underway.

There has also been progress on the 9th Street South project. The Neighborhood Final Design Review meeting took place in January (but not by the newsletter deadline). At this meeting, residents of

the affected block and members of the 9th Street South community gardeners will have reviewed all parts of the project design with the NC planning team. These include:

- Street lights on the north side of the street;
- Storm water drainage improvements;
- Street milling and paving at impacted sections of the street:
  - Completion of missing sidewalk, curb and gutter along the south side of the street;
  - Newly paved trail connector between the street's dead end and the W&OD trail.



exhibition in France at age 14. When Earle was 21, he embarked on a 45-day bike trip across the United States. He painted 42 watercolors and wrote a 10,000-word diary along the way. Shortly after, the Metropolitan Museum of Art purchased one of his watercolors for their permanent collection. Earle continued to paint producing more than 2000 works of art. Students were particularly interested in his work with Disney Studios. He was the background artist on several Disney films including Peter Pan, Sleeping Beauty, and Lady and the Tramp. Eyvind Earle died at the age of 84 in Carmel, California in 2000.

#### Home Renovations: Return on Investment

When upgrading, you can focus on maximizing resale value or personal preference. Getting value out of a remodel project isn't always about price and resale. A recent client earned \$40,000 more on their home sale thanks to the right renovations. They wanted to know whether to sell "as-is" or put money into improvements.
