

Mature Trees are Valuable Trees

Our region is booming. Arlington's population alone has grown over 7 percent since 2010 and is expected to grow another 20 percent by 2040. Homebuyers are drawn to our tree-lined streets, walkable neighborhoods, vibrant parks, convenient amenities, and diverse residents. However, many large, mature trees are being damaged or removed during the construction of new homes and condos. New construction that happens at the expense of trees threatens the unique character that makes our region such a desirable place to live in the first place.

It's no secret that trees add comfort and charm to our lives. They shade our decks, lower electricity bills, increase property values, and reduce flooding risks. According to the US Forest Service, mature trees can account for as much as 10 percent of assessed property value. And, 98 percent of realtors report that mature trees affect the sale of a home. Trees properly placed around a house also reduce heating and cooling costs by 20 to 50 percent. Planting new trees is great, yet when it comes to maximizing the incredible benefits of trees, nothing beats caring for existing mature trees.

The TreeStewards of Arlington and Alexandria have launched a campaign to help residents learn how to properly care for the mature trees on their properties. TreeStewards are available to present at civic associations, HOAs, churches or wherever there are *Continued on page 4*

trees! Simply contact us through www.TreeStewards.org and a volunteer will respond.

"As homeowners and home buyers, we don't have a lot of direct say over big development projects or transportation upgrades. But we do have control over what happens in our yards and to our trees. We can choose to live in neighborhoods with lush, tree-lined streets. And we can choose to take care of the mature trees that we have," explains Nora Palmatier, TreeStewards member.

Mature trees need some basic care. As trees age, a branch here or there may need to be pruned or removed to keep the tree healthy and strong. But, just as you wouldn't amputate an arm because of a cut finger, the whole tree doesn't need to come down just because a branch has gone bad. The TreeStewards recommend following these simple steps to keep mature trees in good health.

 Remove ivy from your tree.
Remove mulch that is piled up around the base of the tree. Keep a 3-inch circle around the base of the tree mulch-free.

3. Construction projects are one of the biggest threats to mature trees. If you are considering construction anywhere in your yard, always contact a certified arborist first so you can avoid damage to tree roots. Find one at GoodTreeCare.com

Caring for mature trees not only protects the tree, it safeguards property values and the character of our neighborhoods. It ensures that we can all continue to enjoy the many benefits of these gentle giants. A certified arborist can provide reliable, clear information and directions for keeping your trees healthy for years to come. Find out more in-

The TreeStewards are a volunteer organization dedicated to the stewardship of a sustainable urban forest in our region. Membership requires graduation from an initial training course, annual continuing education and volunteer service. There are currently 68 members who provided over 4,200 hours of service in 2017, or over \$99,000 worth of work. Last year the group cared for more than 3,700 trees and educated over 2,550 people.



Finally it feels like the weather realizes it is spring with summer fast approaching. I find Barcroft such a beautiful environment.



Also on offer this year will be handcrafted containers suitable for potting, handmade reusable shopping bags, compost tea, local honey, and T-shirts with artwork featuring butterflies and their host plants.
