## For Those at High Risk of COVID-19

At press time, the US has topped 4,200 cases of COVID-19, schools are closing, event gathering has been limited and many of us are starting to work from home in an effort to slow down the spread of this pandemic. Virginia has 52 cases, 13 of which are in Arlington. Cases are likely to grow. Social dis-

tancing can help to slow the spread and flatten the curve, which means our health system will be better able to respond and buys

time for those working on testing, treatments and vaccines.

While our data is still quite limited due to the lack of testing, for now we have to rely on non-pharmaceutical approaches, in-

cluding hand washing (20 seconds with soap), staying home if you are sick at all, and social distancing.

Also, you have probably heard those at higher risk are those aged over 60, and those with cardiovascular disease, diabetes, chronic respiratory disease, or cancer. If you fall into any of these high risk categories, this

message is for you. Younger people and those without immune deficiency are less likely to need critical care if they get sick,

but are likely to be vectors to spread the virus.

Again, if you are sick at all, please stay home! A message was sent out on March 10 to the BSCL chat group asking for volunteers

## Notice to Members of BSCL

Over the weekend of March 14 and 15, 2020, the Barcroft School and Civic League (BSCL) Board of Directions approved three motions in response to the on-going novel coronavirus 2019 epidemic responsible for the COVID-19 illness. During the week of March 8 to 14, 2020, various jurisdictions and organizations in and adjacent to Arlington County began rescheduling or cancelling meetings and activities, and closing facilities. The week culminated with Arlington Public

Schools announcing their closure from March 15 to April 14 and Arlington County's Declaration of Local Emergency in response to the coronavirus. In view of the evolving situation the BSCL Board took action out of an abundance of caution in order to minimize the risk of community spread of the virus to our members, neighbors and the larger community.

The principle effects of these actions included:

- Cancellation of the previously scheduled April 2, 2020 BSCL monthly meeting;
- Suspends use of the Barcroft Community
  House for any public or private gathering
  or other non-emergency use from March
  16 through April 14, 2020, (and authorizes the BSCL President to extend this suspension beyond April 14 until the Arlington County Declaration of Local Emergency has been lifted and the Arlington
  County Public Health Division advises
  there is no longer a risk of community
  spread of the virus);
- Suspends entering into new rental agree-

- ments for the use of the Barcroft Community House until April 14, 2020; and
- Authorizes the BSCL Manager of the Barcroft Community House to refund without penalty any rental agreement fees or deposits paid for use of the facility from March 16 through May 30, 2020, if the user opts to cancel the agreement instead of rescheduling their use until after May 30, 2020.

Oddly, there are even some snow flowers still in prime bloom after being delayed by a lack of sustained cold weather that normally triggers their flowers in late January. Witch hazel, which began flowering in January, is finally fading and about to burst be far behind – and those with tree pollen allergies will, unfortunately, be realizing them anew shortly.

I was unable to attend the March BSCL monthly meeting due to a contractor matter. Thanks to Randy Swart's preparation of draft

minutes for that meeting, which has been forwarded to the BSCL Groups.io chat list, timely information has gone out to members of the chat list gleaned from the Arlington County presentation on the utility (water and wastewater) rate study currently under way.

By now each address in Barcroft should have received a mailing from the U.S. Census Bureau conveying their household's unique key code for entering its information

online as of April 1st as part of the 2020 U.S. Census. Each household's participation in the 2020 Census is important not only to how congressional representation is determined but directly affects the proportionate Federal funding state and local governments receive for education, highways, and a host of other programs. So please do your part and be part of the 2020 Census.

Lastly, consider volunteering to help your neighborhood as a BSCL elected officer

or a member of its Board of Directors. The annual election is scheduled to take place during the May 7 BSCL monthly meeting (subject to change based on COVID-19). All four officer positions and one of the four positions on the Board are up for election. (FYI - I will not be running for reelection to a second term as BSCL President; I have a couple of construction projects beginning this spring that would not leave me time to do justice to the work of the office.) #### BSCL Newsletter Co-Publisher Position Available

For family reasons, I need to step away from my role as co-publisher of the BSCL newsletter. However, my colleague, Theresa Schweser, is continuing in her position. The position, which used to be a one-household volunteer position, has been handled by two households for the past few years. When we took this on, we streamlined the process. We have a great spreadsheet of the carriers' information, as well as labels for the carriers. Having two households involved lessens the workload for each household. At present, each household is responsible for five months of the year, as there are ten issues of the BSCL News pub-

lished yearly. Here are more details of the job:

Our printer is located in the Merrifield area. The printing is often done just a day or two after it is submitted by the BSCL Editor, Alyssa Ford Morel. We pick up the box of newsletters and take them home. The next task is to bundle them into approximately 30 bundles, each counted and labeled for the specific volunteer carriers in our neighborhood. The goal is to get the newsletters to the carriers before the last weekend of the month, so the newsletters can be delivered before the first of the month. Two people in a car can distribute these bundles in about an hour. We will pro-

## **Pruning Your Roses**

There are numerous rose bushes in Barcroft, but a many are not pruned yet.

Now's the time to do so. Here's how:

- Start by removing anything dead. Dead branches are pretty obviously brown or grey as opposed to green with sprouts.
   Also remove old (four or more years) canes to stimulate new growth.
- Depending on the size and type of the plant and how hard you want to prune, reduce the height. Roses can take a lot more pruning than most people think.
- Add room for air by opening up the middle creating a "vase" shape.
- Look for any branches touching each other and remove one of them. Crossing canes damage each other.
- Prune just above an outward facing bud.
- For climbing roses, try to encourage lateral growth, increasing bloom quantity.
