But if past years are something of a guide, we should be enjoying the spring season for several more weeks before the first inklings of summer heat begin to make themselves known. It is usually such a beautiful time of the year in Barcroft (let's not talk about the incredibly wet late spring-early summer we had last year).

As you'll undoubtedly have noticed on the cover of this issue of Barcroft News, the next monthly BSCL meeting on May 7 is cancelled. ### Lubber Run Farmers Market Adjusts to Coronavirus

The Lubber Run Farmers Market at the Barrett Elementary School began its third season the Saturday after Easter. The carefree, community-building atmosphere of the market in the past has been altered by the social adjustments required to overcome the coronavirus pandemic.

On the plus side, the market continues to offer residents the best in seasonal fruit and vegetables and other value-added food items. Many of the vendors have returned from last year. However, the ability of customers to walk freely around the market, try samples at the market tents, and chat with vendors and friends has been seriously reduced in order to meet Virginia's health orders relating to the virus. We have seen similar effects in every corner of Arlington.

The market has adopted a market safety code to ensure that customers and vendors remain safe and have a good experience. All customers should enter the market through the end close to North Henderson Road. A gatekeeper regulates how many customers can be within the market space at any time. The market recognizes the value of social distancing. Vendors are required to wear food-handling gloves and face masks, and customers are encouraged to do the same. Almost all food sold in the market this year is prepackaged to minimize the number

of times it is touched. People at the market cannot walk freely through the fruit and vegetable tents. Discussions with individual vendors should be arms length. Children should not be brought to market under these conditions. Indeed, having one adult come to the market to purchase for the family is ideal. Market customers will exit at the north end of the market near North Park Drive.

Market traffic will flow through the market from south to north. That reduces the risk of people coming into close contact with one another. People may need to queue up to enter the market. They may also need to queue again when approaching particular vendor tents. Always follow the 6-foot social distancing rule. Use your time in line to decide what items you want to buy when you get to the front. Buying quickly and moving on is desired.

If driving to the market, figure out in advance where you want to park. Parking along North Park Drive will be best for many, especially if they have a lot of purchased food to bring home. If your household eats a lot, consider bringing a light shopping cart or a children's wagon to reduce the burden of carrying all.

State guidelines encourage customers and vendors to maximize preordering of food days in advance in order to reduce the time needed in market. Check with favored

functioning. We are so lucky that Linda Gaines has volunteered to take over for me. I want to publically thank her for allowing me to pass on this important function with full


confidence that she will do a fabulous job.

am's earlier Executive Order which seeks residents to stay at home and prohibits gatherings of more than ten people (an order that extends until June 10, 2020, as of this writing). (Similarly, use of the Barcroft Community House by renters continues to be suspended until health authorities determine whether such uses can safely resume.) Also, look for the newest COVID-19 graphic on page 6 of this issue of Barcroft News.

Many of you will recall that the May monthly BSCL meeting is when, as a non-stock

corporation in Virginia, it normally holds its "annual meeting," as required by the State Corporation Commission. The annual meeting includes the election of officers and one of the Board of Directors positions. With the May meeting cancelled BSCL is looking into alternative approaches to holding this election so the continuity of its organizational functions can transition seamlessly to the successors. 

I hope you and your families are well and finding some creative ways to remain safely at home. It's great to see the Arlington community supporting many of our local businesses, helping them stay afloat, especially the carryout and delivery at local restaurants.

Regionally and locally we're seeing a slowdown with buyer traffic. New listing inventory is low as well. Demand remains strongest for single family homes in the \$600K - \$900K range. As of this writing, Arlington has about 1.5 months of inventory, about double from February but still way below the national average. Dual-income households are feeling more financially secure than single-income buyers. Buyers with kids are more motivated and have fewer choices than somebody buying a 1- or 2-bedroom condo who can easily find a rental apartment until things improve. Rates have dropped again to the low to mid 3% range, and lenders are busy with refinances

and purchase loans. That's a motivating factor for buyers.

We are changing the way we do business and have become more virtual these days. Many of our consultations are done on Zoom or Facetime. With no more public open houses, I did my first Virtual Open House on Facebook live recently. A few days later the home was under contract.
