

Butterflies of Barcroft

We lay on the carpet with our faces inches from the clear window into the butterfly cage as the large monarch caterpillar hung from the top of the cage and wiggled. Her antennae were crinkled and drooping straight

Suddenly, we could see a bright green bulge starting just behind her head, and as she spun and moved, her skin split and the green bulge grew larger. Within minutes her skin peeled slowly upward and became a thin black ring at the top of the stem where she was attached to the ceiling of the cage. Our caterpillar had become a chrysalis, and ten days later, she hatched out as a beautiful monarch butterfly.

We had been waiting all summer for the monarchs to come to Barcroft. We planted milkweed and went on butterfly walks, looking for the bright orange flash of wings. We saw lots of milkweed in gardens scattered across Barcroft, but we saw only a few monarchs through the long, hot months of May,

The students at Our Savior are continuing to grow. Recently, our Kindergarten class spent time making homemade applesauce. Our 1st and 3rd grades have been busy learning more about the life cycle of plants. They examined seeds, planted them, and patiently waited for them to sprout. Once they did, they learned how to carefully replant the seedlings into planter boxes. We can't wait to watch them as they continue to grow. Our 5th grade studied Vincent van Gogh and Claude Monet. They looked at their many works of Impressionism including Starry Night by van Gogh and Water Lilies by Monet. Then they had a chance to make their own creations of those works of art. How cool! And in 8th grade, our students just fin-

ished studying globalization in geography class. So amazing to understand how the world is really interconnected in so many ways.

June and most of July. Finally, in late July, the monarchs began to arrive. We would stand far away as the females landed on a favorite milkweed in the front garden and laid eggs. Then we would dash over to retrieve an egg or two and bring them inside to hatch out as caterpillars. We didn't collect all the eggs, but the survival rate for monarch eggs and caterpillars in

the wild (including Barcroft gardens) is less than 10 percent, while caterpillars raised inside are far more likely to survive to become butterflies. We felt that every egg saved was important.

The monarch population is declining, in good part due to a loss of habitat, so planting milkweed is the most important thing you can do to help them..

In the end, we raised twenty-three healthy monarchs from twenty-five eggs, and we released the butterflies





to begin their leg of the 2,000 plus mile migration from Canada to Mexico. It was an amazing

experience, and we hope that our efforts will help these beautiful creatures survive as a species.

If you are interested in the butterflies of Barcroft, it's easy to help the monarchs and other butterflies by including Native Virginia native plants in your garden. While there are nearly a dozen types of milkweed locally native to Northern Virginia, three are the most com-

> mon: Asclepias tuberosa (Butterfly weed), Asclepias incarnata (Swamp milkweed), and Asclepias syriaca (Common milkweed). We had the best luck with the Swamp milkweed (with pink flowers) and Butterfly weed (wih



orange flowers). One plant was purchased at a local nursery, and one was grown from seeds ordered online. The monarchs were happy to lay eggs on both plants, and if you looked carefully, cat-

erpillars were munching away on the leaves for most of August and early September.

Hopefully, we will be less homebound next summer, but even so, we will be waiting for the monarchs to return and hoping to see the miracle of monarch transformations again.

Did you know that the Summer surge continued into September for Northern Virginia Home Sales? The Northern Virginia real estate market produced yet another strong sales month for September, with the pace of sales continuing to eclipse activity during the same time period in 2019. A total of 2,166 homes sold in September 2020, a 38% increase above September 2019 home sales of 1,578. September activity was a continuation of the strengthening market Northern Virginia has witnessed since June. Active listings decreased in September compared with 2019. Listings were down 5.62% below last year, with 2,469 active listings in September, compared with 2,616 homes available in September 2019. The average days on market for homes in September 2020 fell by 38.71% to 19 days - compared to 31 days on market for homes in September 2019.

Decreased inventory levels of homes for sale, coupled with increased buyer demand and low interest rates, has created a true seller's market where prices are increasing and the number of days a home stays on the market is dropping. The average home price for Northern VA was \$690.981, up 15.09% from 2019. Arlington's average was \$826,675, up 17.09% from last year.
