Arlington's next pop-up drop-off for household hazardous materials and old electronics is set for Saturday, October 8, 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Wakefield High School, 1325 South Dinwiddie Street.

Please note: Metal items and bicycle donations will not be accepted during this first-time use of Wakefield. Vehicles should access the drop-off routing from South Columbus Street at South George Mason Drive.

Speak with neighbors ahead of time, combine loads and save trips. Read the lists of materials that will be accepted and not accepted. Arlington residents only.

Of course you don't need to wait for E-CARE to rid a home of aging goop and deceased clock radios. The County offers safe, easy drop-off and even curbside options for proper disposal year-round.

## Enjoy the Outdoors Without Fear of Ticks

#### From the Master Gardeners of Northern Virginia

With the weather starting to cool off, now is a good time to get out and enjoy nature. Ticks will still be active but there are easy ways to protect yourself, your children, and pets.

Wear long sleeves and pants, with pant legs tucked into socks (lighter clothing will make it easier to see any ticks), and use bug repellant – 25 to 30 percent DEET, 20 percent Picaridin, oil of Eucalyptus, or IR-3535 (Merck 3535).

Walk in the center of paths to avoid tall grass and vegetation where ticks like to

hide waiting for their next meal.

Check yourself, your children and pets for ticks every few hours or when coming in after being out in potentially tick-infested areas. Removing ticks within a few hours of attachment will sharply reduce the potential of disease transmission.

Putting your clothes in a hot dryer for 20 minutes will kill any ticks on them.

Consult with your vet on appropriate tick prevention for pets.

Spraying of pesticides is ineffective against ticks, which reside in the leaf litter, but will harm pollinators and other beneficial insects.

#### Neighborhood Shredding Event! Mark your calendars for October 8th from 10 AM to 1 PM



Location: Arlington Forest Shopping Center 4821 1st St N
The mobile shredding truck can hold up to 10,000 pounds of paper.

What is allowed: They can shred paper clips, binder clips, staples, butterfly clips, spiral notebooks, notebooks with a binding spine, metal-tabbed hanging folders, and the thin metal strips that are on presentation folders along with your paper.

What is not allowed: They cannot shred cardboard, x-rays, or CDs along with the paper as it will contaminate and dilute the paper load causing the recycler to not accept it. They cannot shred three-ring binders as the metal spine and the rings are too much for the shredder.
