President's Message

The February message is a tough one to write. There are no New Years resolutions to talk about (unless we're talking about already-broken ones). Despite the recent warm-ish weather, it's too early for the "Spring in Barcroft" piece, and no one wants to talk about the weather in February anyway. We haven't even had a chance to celebrate the Barcroft Snow Brigade this year.

So let's just talk about a couple of things going on in the neighborhood. We had a productive discussion of a proposed Arlington Civic Federation resolution on transparency in government during our January meeting. Feedback from the community was essential in providing guidance to our Civ Fed delegates; we ultimately decided Barcroft cannot support the resolution as it is currently written.

Construction along Columbia Pike continues. Expect it to continue for a while; the improvements between Wakefield and Oakland aren't expected to be completed until late 2025. Not all of the segment will be under construction at once, and the County intends to give two weeks notice of traffic changes as the construction moves up and down that segment.

Progress is being made, however.

Two of the Pike's multimodal transit stations

are now open, with five more (including at Columbia Pike and Buchanan Street) expected to open by the end of January. The stations should have full electrical service in February.

Soon after, new limited-stop Metrobus service and neighborhood connections via ART will begin in Spring 2023.

Grants for History Projects

Arlington County now has a grant program for community and individual history projects. Grants will support maintaining historic buildings, tours of historic neighborhoods, plans for historic commercial areas, historic research, oral histories, historic markers, nominations to the National Register of Historic Places and educational activities. Capital projects (limit \$100,000) require 100 percent matching funds. Non-capital projects are limited to \$25,000. The application period closes on April 28. 



The graph below shows the rise and fall of mortgage rates in 2002. As of mid-January, <u>rates</u> <u>have dropped slightly below 6%</u>, and we have seen an increase in buyer activity.
