It's Back! Barcroft Elementary Online Auction Feb 3 to 11

President's Message

Maybe it's because I have a vicious miniature goldendoodle regularly patrolling, or maybe it's because I'm not terribly observant, but I haven't noticed significant deer damage in my yard. That's despite their regular presence inside my fence and the wealth of native vegetative treats I grow for them. So I've generally been skeptical of calls to manage the deer herd in Arlington, categorizing them (admittedly, unfairly), as the complaints of gardeners who see their mission as taming the wilderness rather than embracing it.

But the data presented by Master Naturalist Bill Browning at BSCL's January meeting indicates deer are having a substantial impact on the forest ecosystem outside our gardens. Browse rates (i.e., the percentage of vegetation in an area chomped on by deer) in the Grandma's Creek area are around 80%. A sustainable browse rate is around 50%. These rates prevent the regeneration of native trees and shrubs, and they inhibit attempts to restore degraded areas. That could be particularly important for Barcroft as we have several ongoing efforts to improve the Grandma's Creek area.

The County is currently considering options for managing Arlington's herd, including selective culling. The County will be engaging in community outreach regarding its plans and accepting feedback over the next couple months.

Barcroft Fences and Good Neighbors

We all know the old adage about fences making good neighbors, but I would amend it to include that Barcroft fences add substantial enjoyment to a neighborhood walk.

No doubt, Barcroft has its share of wooden privacy and chain link fences that efficiently contain dogs and children and remind us of where to mow; but it also has some notably beautiful fences that front Barcroft homes.

A Barcroft classic is the stone fence topped with stone teeth. These fences seem to have long been a feature in Barcroft and you can see a beautiful example at the corner of South Taylor and 4th where the fence used to front a single house with a lot that stretched all the way up Taylor to the park. The house is long gone, but luckily the lovely fence is preserved. There is another long one like this, although with a few missing "teeth" on 8th Street South.

Taylor Street also has some great examples of the classic white picket fence. On the corner of Taylor and 8th there are two kitty-corner from each other. One has beautiful French Gothic pickets and the other swooping scalloped curves between posts. There are another two across the street from each other on the corner of South Pershing and Wakefield – one white and one, breaking somewhat with tradition but nicely matched to the brick and tree-filled yard, stained red.

The wrought iron fence is another classic that really compliments Barcroft's many brick homes. A beautiful one surrounds a house and its lovely garden is on the corner of 4th and Taylor.

A particular favorite of mine (and also a repeat from my earlier article on garden features) is the art deco pressed concrete fence on 8th Street South. It has lovely curves and integrated flowerpots. And kudos to the Barcroft neighbor who live here who completed a recent renovation without losing or damaging this beautiful fence!

But Barcroft fences are not just classic styles, there are some lovely modern wooden fences with horizontal rails. The one on the corner of Taylor and 8th Street with the gaps in the rails bigger at the top than bottom is particularly nice. I also like the one further west on 8th Street that includes a sliding gate for the driveway. And while you are admiring these stylish designs, take a moment to appreciate the bonus "fence" in the little decorative feature on the second story of the craftsman style bungalow on Taylor just south of 8th Street.

My all-time neighborhood favorite though is the amazing hedge that fronts the bungalow on 6th Street South just off Wakefield. The hedge is an amazing work of master gardening and pruning. It is massive, tall, unbroken, and a beautiful curving oval shape uniformly fronting the whole lot.

To me, this hedge and these other fences capture the essence of Barcroft and why it is such a great place to live. Even with our (mostly) little lots and established modestly sized houses, our neighborhood is filled with residents, who invest in their homes, and add delight and a friendly welcome to our neighbors. So get out and enjoy and appreciate our lovely little corner of Arlington.
