#### **Market Update** - According to the monthly Credit Suisse agent survey, the buyer traffic index in the DC area jumped higher in March with a reading of 62 (vs. 39 in February) and the highest reading in three years. Consumer confidence is growing, and in most sectors homes priced right in affordable price points are getting multiple offers. Single family homes & townhouses seem to be the most desirable commodity. March and mid-April trends in the local area indicate that demand is outpacing supply, more so in affordable price ranges.

**Remodeling Trends** - Remodeling Magazine has created home remodeling project estimates for 20 years. They survey over 6,000 realtors nationwide along with RemodelMAX, a publisher of remodeling cost estimating tools. Variance exists nationwide as all remodeling costs will be different in regions of the country, and few of them will attain 90% ROI.

In the 2016 DC area Cost Vs. Value report, a Minor Kitchen remodel costing \$20,742 returned 96.4% at \$19,999 was the <u>fourth highest return</u>. Fiberglass attic insulation <u>was number two</u> on the list at a cost of \$1,287, yielding a 99.4% return at \$1,279. The industry report focuses on paid labor, not DIY. ### The Lurking Menace of Barcroft: Why Invasives Matter

There are a lot of nasty characters lurking around the Barcroft neighborhood and the adjacent W&OD trail. They masquerade as attractive, healthy foliage. Known as invasives, their vigor and attractiveness is generally what started them on the road to delinguent behavior.

Many invasives were introduced as appealing, easy to grow nursery plants. Some have lovely flowers, berries or other interesting characteristics. Their thuggish nature is re-



# Running for Turtles

Turtle and run are not two words you hear put in the same sentence very often but we are looking for folks to run for turtles on Sunday, May 15 at Bluemont Park. That's when we hold the Turtle Trot 5K race for adults and kids, with the proceeds going to our reptile rehabilitation program. Long Branch Nature Center is the only facility in Northern Virginia that provides rehabilitation for sick and injured turtles and other reptiles.

Every year, caring people bring us about forty sick or injured turtles and smaller number of snakes for rehabilitation. Naturalist Rachael Tolman, our licensed rehabilitator, diagnoses and treats their afflictions and then we provide them with food, water and shelter until they are ready to go back to their wild lives. We have seen some horrifically injured turtles come through our door that Rachael's skills, the compassionate care of our volunteers and a turtle's natural toughness have overcome.

All this care incurs expenses for medicines, food and supplies and that's where the Turtle Trot 5K comes in, with registration fees helping to cover much of these costs. The registration fee is \$30 for adults and \$15 for children 12 and under. You can register in advance online at Active.com; a limited number of same day registration slots may also be available. We'll also have activities for kids and a real turtle race after the people run. The race is chip-timed and is on a certified course. Here are the rest of the details:

instead chomp on natives and friendly nonnatives, allowing the invasives to spread unchecked.

Invasives are bad for the environment in a number of ways. Some vines such as Japanese Honeysuckle, exotic Wisterias and Oriental Bittersweet wrap around young trees and strangle them as they struggle to grow. Other vines (Porcelainberry, English Ivy and Kudzu) smother the plants they grow on, depriving them of light and weighting them down. Some invasives produce thousands of seeds (Mimosa, Ailanthus, Garlic Mustard), sending up countless babies to spread rapidly. Others have roots that are nearly impossible to remove completely (Bamboo, Lesser Celandine). Ailanthus and Garlic Mustard, among others, are also allelopathic, producing biochemicals that inhibit the growth of other plants. English Ivy can hold water perfect for breeding mosquitos and serve as habitat for rats.

None of the invasives do the important work that plants, at the bottom of the food chain, are supposed to do — supporting local wildlife. Compare a White Oak Tree that supports 532 species of Lepidoptera caterpillars to the Ailanthus which supports two, and you'll see the difference. Considering that the Carolina Chickadee, one of our tiniest local birds, must feed a clutch of nestlings an estimated 3,000 caterpillars before they fledge, which tree do you think is pulling its weight in

#### the ecosystem?

Invasives can pop up in our yards without us planting them. Sometimes they creep under fences from neighbors' yards without either homeowner noticing. Birds eat the seeds, serving as propagators as they poop the seeds out far from the original source. To an untrained eye, many invasives are difficult to recognize, especially when immature. But it is important we not harbor invasives which can easily escape to public and wild spaces where less maintenance means they can thrive and out-compete more valuable natives in our ecosystem.

Here is a list of invasives commonly seen around Barcroft and on the W&OD Trail abutting our neighborhood, though by no means is it a complete list of all the invasives that can be found here.
