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### Sweet Sounds of Spring

#### SONGSTERS RETURN FOR SPRING

Volcano orange, ruby red, deep indigo blue, sun-flower yellow – are these the new "in" decorating colors for 2005? No! They're some of the words you might use to describe the gorgeous, little migratory birds, called warblers that live here only during the warm months of the year. Beginning in late April and lasting through May, hundreds of new voices will join the dawn chorus in our woodlands as these birds arrive from their winter home in Central and South America to announce the arrival of spring.

Some are just passing through on their way further north. Others will stay here in Arlington where they will nest and raise young. All of them will benefit if you provide the four basic elements of habitat in your yard. Food, water, sheltered places to rest and escape from the weather and predators, and places to raise young are critical to the survival of these magical creatures during this exhausting twice a year trip!

#### WILDLIFE HABITATS

The Arlington Community Wildlife Habitat team is ready to help you make your property wildlife-friendly. If you join the Neighborhood Challenge and get your property certified before September 30, 2005, you can help your Civic Association gain bragging rights as the most wildlife-friendly place in Arlington! Arlington is well on its way to becoming the first county in the nation to be certified by the National Wildlife Federation as a Community Wildlife Habitat.

#### RECIPE CORNER

This cheesy soup will please the whole family. My nine year old nephews loved it even AF-TER they heard about the healthy ingredients it contains. Submitted by: Skip Adams

#### GOLDEN CHEDDAR CHEESE SOUP

1 cup chopped onions

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

2 medium potatoes, thinly sliced

1 medium carrot, thinly sliced

1 medium yellow summer squash, thinly sliced

1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper pinch of turmeric

2 cups vegetable stock or water

1 cup buttermilk or milk

1 cup grated sharp cheddar cheese

Saute the onions in the oil for about 5 minutes or until the onions begin to soften. Stir in the potatoes and next four ingredients. Add stock/water and simmer for 15 to 20 minutes. Stir in milk and cheese. Puree the soup in a blender or food processor. Gently reheat.

#### Columbia Pike Spring Update

CHANGE ON COLUMBIA PIKE, it's been predicted for a long time. This year we will see it happen. In 1998 Arlington County launched the Columbia Pike Initiative. In 2000 the initiative led to the Columbia Pike Initiative Planning Process. In 2002 the process resulted in the Columbia Pike Initiative: A Revitalization Plan. The plan included recommendations that led, in 2003, to the Columbia Pike Form-Based Code and Columbia Pike Economic Incentives. Last year, the Columbia Pike Street Space Task Force presented its recommendations. All these steps taken over the last six years and involving nearly 300 community and public meetings have resulted in a vision of Columbia Pike as a pleasant and safe place. It is a place where we can walk from home to work, shopping, entertainment and play.

Adams Square—Owners B.M. Smith Associates are working with Carbon Thompson Development to bring a full size Giant grocery store to the site. The project will include additional street-front retail space, with residential apartments above. In addition to the parking provided for retail/grocery customers and residents, the project will include more than 250 public parking spaces. This development will also lead to the construction of the eastern half of a public plaza framed by Columbia Pike on the south; S. Barton St. to the east; new shops to the north; and the Fillmore Shopping Center on the west. The building can be up to six stories on Columbia Pike and can be no more than 3 ½ stories on S. 9<sup>th</sup> St.

Axumite Village—is a multi-family residential development under consideration by the Ethiopian Community Development Council, Inc. (ECDC). The project includes condominiums and townhouses on ECDC's former headquarters site behind the SunTrust Bank property. The project will include a new section of S. 11<sup>th</sup> St. between S. Highland St. and the Brown's Nissan property. Parking for all units will be provided underground.

Columbia Center— The 257 unit development with more than 40,000 square feet of retail and 450 underground parking spaces is the first Columbia Pike Form Based Code project to be approved. In addition to the residential, retail and parking elements, the project includes a restoration of the Arlington Hardware building façade, a permanent home for the Arlington Free Clinic and removal of the outmoded Dominion Electric Power substation.

Safeway Site—More than 25,000 square feet of new retail space on Columbia Pike will fill the ground floor of this six story, residential building. Parking will be below ground.

Trammell Crow Residential—is developing a 9 story retail/residential building at 5500 Columbia Pike. This property is allowed additional height within the Columbia Pike Form Based Code as it is surrounded by high-rise buildings. More than 200 condominiums will rise above the street-level retail. Parking for the project will be underground.

#### **COMING PIKE EVENTS**

Columbia Pike Blues Festival returns for its tenth run. The 10<sup>th</sup> Annual Columbia Pike Blues Festival on Sunday, June 5. Noon—6:00 p.m. Columbia Pike Blues Festival is FREE.

Farmers Market at Pike Park begins its season on Sunday, May 1. Located in Pike Park at the corner of Walter Reed and Columbia Pike, the market provides an array of produce, meats, cheeses, baked goods, flowers and more.

Pike Transit Initiative (PTI) Public Forums--to present a proposed transit solution for Columbia Pike are anticipated for late April or early May. The PTI working group has been studying the Bus Rapid Transit and Streetcar options and will produce a DRAFT Final Analysis in April. Public forums for both Arlington and Fairfax Counties will follow. Watch your mail for the specific dates and locations.
