Make Plans. Sit down with your family. Write down how you will contact each other and where you will re-unite when it is safe to move. The most common reason people leave a safe place is to check on family. If you know family members are safe, you will stay safe where you are and

know you will re-unite.

Assemble Supplies. Get the basics you need to stay where you are or get to a safe place water and nonperishable food, a battery powered flashlight and radio, extra batteries, and a first aid kit

Confident City Cycling Class in Arlington

The Washington Area Bicyclist Association (WABA) is pleased to announce that it has scheduled an additional Confident City Cycling Class on September 10th, in Arlington.

The class, which is free and open to the public, is designed to provide bike riders with the skills they need incorporate bicycling into their daily routines.

The three-hour classroom session teaches the basics of traffic cycling on city streets for errands, commuting, and fun. The principles of lane positioning will be explained, along with techniques for avoiding some of the more common hazards. As time allows, bicycle fit and maintenance, emergency repairs, gearing and pedaling, nutrition, and accessory equipment will be covered. An optional one-hour bike ride follows the in-class segment.

The class will be held on Saturday September 10th at Arlington Fire Department's Staion #9 located at

1900 South Walter Reed Drive from 9am to noon with an optional on-road session from noon to 1pm. This station is four uphill blocks north of the Four Mile Run and W&OD trails via Walter Reed Drive. Bike racks are located at the 19th St S entrance.

WABA asks that those who plan to join the on-road sessions afterwards bring a bike, helmet, water, and a lock.

Tree Stewards Take Root in September

Everyone who loves Arlington's trees should consider enrolling in the Tree Steward volunteer training course scheduled to begin September 13, 2005.

The course teaches the basics of tree growth, planting, and urban forest canopy. Upon completion of the course Tree Stewards are expected to contribute over 25 hours of community service improving our urban forest by teaching others and doing service projects related to trees. In the past three years the course has enrolled over 75 people who are happy to be called tree huggers.

Participants are involved in planting and caring for trees on school grounds, removing invasive vines from trees, inventorying trees in local parks, promoting private tree planting and good tree care, and working with local urban forestry commissions.

You Can Help a Neighbor.

Every year the Community Outreach Program (Arlington County DHS) and volunteers assist families in filling out back to school forms at several locations around the county: Buckingham, Berkeley Apartments, and Arlington Mill Community Center. We primarily assist families who speak English as a second language, but a second language is not needed for the volunteer.

This information is important to the schools and we assist about 300 families each year.

Volunteers are needed from 6-9 pm on September 6, 2005.
