Arlington County remembers the lives lost at the Pentagon and honors those who responded to the attack. The public is invited to attend the brief observance. Arlington County Board Chairman Christopher Zimmerman hosts the event. The program includes a combined honor guard, the singing of the National Anthem, a moment of silence at 9:37 a.m., and the tolling of a bell 184 times, once for each victim.

Adaline Marye was born in 1903 in the big white house at Arlington Avenue and Fairfax Street. (Now 9th and Buchanan). She grew up here in Barcroft, eventually married a Robertson and then years later came back to live in her childhood home.

If you saw the Barcroft Players do the *Tales of Barcroft*, it was Barbara Swart's script resulting from stories that Adaline told her husband, Randy, about growing up in Barcroft. The Barcroft Players put on a special performance of *Tales of Barcroft* for Adaline's 100th birthday party at her retirement home. It was a memorable occasion. Adaline had reviewed the script and made several changes for historical accuracy.

We are sorry to say that Adaline passed away on August 9th at age 103 after a stroke about a week before. Her niece Polly said that she passed away peacefully. Polly had just traveled here from Texas in mid-July as she did each year to celebrate Adaline's birthday. Adaline was still sharp and remembered yet another story - this one about going to see Taft's inauguration as a child and seeing the outgoing Roosevelt (that's Teddy!).

In an almost Buddhist coincidence, Annie and Eric Harold, who live in Adaline's old house on Buchanan Street, had a new baby born in their home 2 days before Adaline's 103rd birthday. (You may already have met her as Annie's patriotically painted belly in the Fourth of July parade.) A 1903 edition of the Barcroft News notes, "Miss Kate Roberson was a caller upon Barcroft friends last week. She didn't miss the opportunity of seeing the baby at the Maryes'." The baby at the Maryes' was Adaline, born to Annie Marye. The new baby at the Marye's house is Adeline born to Annie Harold. So the circle of life goes on in Barcroft.
