
Many thanks to all who participated in last month's BSCL meeting. We came up with a collective list of projects, available on the website at www.bscl.org, that we would like to see the County finish in our neighborhood in the next decade or so. The next step will be drafting our Neighborhood Conservation Plan update, which explains in narrative form what the neighborhood would like to see done, and prioritizes projects for the County. We hope all will participate in this vital process for our neighborhood and let us know what projects are most important to you.

Please join your neighbors for the next BSCL meeting, Thursday, October 4 at 7:30p.m. at the Community House. Our Arlington County Police Captain Michelle Nuneville and her officers will be joining us for a discussion of recent criminal and other illegal activity in our neighborhood. We also

anticipate having representatives from the County Board on hand.

At the last meeting, neighbors brought the concerns about areas near Four Mile Run Park and Columbia Pike before the membership. I hope neighbors with concerns in those or other areas of the neighborhood will come share their experiences at the meeting, so that we can discuss with the County and police representatives how we can most effectively fight crime and ensure enforcement of County regulations in Barcroft.

On Saturday, October 13 at 10:00am, all are invited to gather for an invasive plant removal day down on the W&OD trail. Barcroft Master Gardener Shirley Gay is organizing it and will provide more info as the date approaches. It will be a great way to get out in the fall air and meet your neighbors while helping to improve the trail. Watch the website for details.

The County will accept household hazardous materials for safe disposal, computer and electronics for recycling, shoes and eyeglasses for programs in developing countries, and bicycles for collection by Bikes for the World.

There is a handling fee for computer monitors (\$15) and televisions (\$20). A donation of \$10 per bike is requested to ship the bike to a developing country.

Homes and buildings on the tour will display a mixture of solar passive and solar powered designs including photovoltaic (PV) systems, solar hot water systems, radiant heat, efficient appliances and energy saving building construction techniques. 
Visitors will be able to tour the homes and discuss the systems with the homeowners.

Senior Project is a challenging and worthwhile graduation requirement. At Wakefield, each senior chooses, defines and accomplishes a significant *real world* project. The project, which includes both research and field experience, reflects approximately 150 hours of work. Students document their hours in journals and write about their experiences in personal essays.

Each project culminates in a 10 to 25 minute oral presentation before an assessment panel. Wakefield is proud to say that all students -- regular, advanced, those who speak English as a second language, and special education students -- have an equal and exciting opportunity to achieve excellence in this program.

Upon completion, many students say that Senior Project is their most significant accomplishment so far and that this success has given them the confidence to tackle whatever challenges lie ahead.

Barcroft Elementary School

Did you notice that Barcroft was a little more colorful when you strolled by Barcroft Elementary School during the week of September 16?

Colorful art covered the sidewalks, parking lots and playground as part of Chalk 4 Peace. Chalk 4 Peace is a global arts project (started here in Arlington) that encourages sidewalk art from artists of all ages on the theme of peace. I hope you had a chance to join our young Barcrofters as they created their masterpiece or a chance to enjoy their peace-minded art!

Kenmore Middle School

Kenmore Middle School is as one of 16 schools in the Washington D.C. metropolitan area that are members of the Kennedy Center's Changing Education Through the Arts (CETA) program. The partnership with the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, which began in 1999, helps teachers develop their expertise in integrating the arts with the teaching of other school subjects (such as history, language arts, science). The Kennedy Center and the schools work together to develop, implement, and evaluate an in-depth staff development program of courses, workshops, coaching, and study groups.

Wakefield High School

The design team, led by Bowie Gridley Architects, completed the Wakefield Feasibility Study. This study reports on the investigation of existing conditions at the site, summarizes the educational specification, and presents three design concept alternatives. As of July, the School Board has suspended the activities of the Building Level Planning Committees (BLPCs) of three on-going APS capital projects, Wakefield included.


