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


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See you at the Parade.

They were surrounded by many neighbors who participated as cast members or off stage baking refreshments, helping with make up, directing, taking money, perfecting the sound, scene production and lights.



Seller Subsidies: Financial Incentives Help To Sell Homes Faster

In the sellers' market during the past, seller subsidies totaled about 2 % of the sales. As the Northern Virginia housing market returns to a more balanced market, seller concessions are offered in an increasing share of transactions. In the last six months, seller-subsidized sales have made up 60% of the sales.

Seller subsidies can include help with closing costs, decorator allowances, and other up front cash offered from the seller to the buyer upon settlement. In most situations it is assumed that a buyer may include subsidy in their offer. Sometimes sellers offer subsidies to attract buyers and reduce the time their property sits on the market without reducing the list price. A \$10,000 subsidy might mean more to a buyer than a \$20,000 price reduction.

Sellers should realize that seller contributions have typically accompanied about a third of home sales regionally throughout all phases of the market. Second, the location, conditionasking price of the home all influence whether a home sells with or without a seller subsidy.

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
