

President's Report

The summer has flown by one more time, and the BSCL begins meeting again on **Thursday**, **September 3rd**. Because Labor falls on the 7th, we hope to catch you all before you leave for long labor weekend out of town!

The meeting on the 3rd will feature reports on the renewal of the Demeter House use permit, and on the work being done on the track at the Barcroft School. The meeting will also feature a presentation by Andrea Morris, the Arlington County "Base Realignment and Closure" Coordinator on the construction that continues on the National Guard Bureau and State Department facilities on George Mason Drive. The BSCL and the Alcova Heights Civic Association are working together (with Arlington County staff) to monitor the current parking impact on nearby streets and other long term impacts, and on the plans to accommodate the significant growth coming our way. I hope you'll be able to join us.

This was a busy summer for Barcroft neighborhood concerns. The Arlington County planning staff began work on the "Columbia Pike Housing Study", and have hosted several meetings with representatives from civic associations along the Pike, as well as other stakeholders, to consider how our community would like to see the multi-family housing locations along the Pike "redevelop" in the decades to come. This study is a follow-up to the Columbia

Pike initiative and form based code planning work done in the 2002-2003 timeframe. Because this planning work will have an important impact on how our neighborhoods evolve, and how affordable housing options change, there will be much more to follow on this important planning effort.

In July the Arlington County Board accepted the Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Committee's proposed funding for improvements to the Four Mile Run trail at Columbia Pike. This proposal was the result of hard work by a BSCL committee focused on making this highly visible stretch of the trail and green space safer and more accessible for a variety of uses. It is gratifying to note that the Board affirmed this hard work over an objection from another Arlington neighborhood representative who challenged the design efforts of our Barcroft neighbors. Thanks for your hard work!

Finally, congratulations to **Andrew Hunter** for another wonderful July 4 parade, and to all those who made the festivities that followed a big success!

Since coming to Barcroft in 1993, Julie Gorka has been the notochord of the communities' music scene. Here are some highlights:

- For many seasons she has been the music director of the annual Xmas program which we are enjoying this evening.
- She has unselfishly given of her time and talent to accompany many closet soloists at their recitals, schools and places of work. Most memorable were the timeless performances she brought to the BSCL Community House with the late Jack Turner. Few were left untouched by the fearless enthusiasm with which Julie and Jack shared their renditions of "Dance of the Toys" and "Bugler's March."

Julie has accompanied not only amateur and but interntionally known musicians as well such as Scottish fiddle champion, Elka Baker. She has provided rhythm and harmony to the cooking of the gourmet chefs who have hosted the annual BSCL Spaghetti Feast at the Community House. Playing with Barcrofter Mike Nazaretz and other wonderful area musicians in the World Reknowned "Spaghetti Tones", her suspended 9th and diminished minor 4th cords have turned a gustatory orgy into a sensory epiphany.

Julie founded the JulieYard International School of Music where she gently, patiently introduced the areas' youth to the magic world of music. She is responsible for transforming many of the area's youth and parents into fine pianists and aspiring artists.

Julie was the founder and director of the "World Famous Marching Fiddlers" which has graced the 4th of July parade for years with their dancing virtuosity. The Marching Fiddlers won 1st place as the 'Best Marching Unit' numerous times, too many to count.

Since coming to Barcroft, Julie has been making a mark as a composer of jigs, reels and waltzes. Few can doubt her genius after hearing her " Barcoft House" which has become a standard at many traditional music sessions and contra dances after being composed in 2000.

The Barcroft News is too short to recite all the contributions Julie has made to the music at Barcoft. Without question her presence has unassumedly shaped the quality of community life we enjoy here.

RECYLING is EASY in Arlington!

All Arlington residents can recycle more materials at the curbside. No sorting is needed!

Recyclable Materials Accepted

- Plastic Containers # 1-7
- Rigid Plastics such as Margarine and Dairy tubs and yogurt cups
- Aluminum foil & trays
- Milk & Juice Cartons
- Aerosol Cans
- Books
- Plastic Bags (Place Bags in a Bag)
- Cardboard boxes (unflattened is fine!)

New Wheeled Carts will hold larger quantities of recyclables, keep contents dry, and make it easy to wheel out materials to the curb. Single family homes will receive a 65 gallon cart and townhomes will receive a 35 gallon cart.

Recyclables no longer need to be separated! All materials may be placed into one cart.

Recycle Electronics at the Curb

Residents may now request a special curbside pickup of electronic recyclable materials. Requests are accepted at <u>www.arlingtonva.us/recycle</u> or by calling 703-228-6570. There is a \$10.00 charge for computer monitors and \$20.00 for TVs. Items should be placed at the curb next to the recycling cart on the scheduled pick up date.

The **County will replace the yellow recycling** bins with new wheeled carts over an eight week **period.** A new curbside recycling guide will be delivered with the new carts.

Residents are encouraged to keep their yellow bins and make them an integral part of your home recycling system.

Get the Right Home Warranty

The 13 Seer Rule, which defines the energy efficiency standard for central air conditioning systems, has been in force since 1/2006. The impact of this has eliminated the manufacturing of equipment or parts for any AC system built or installed prior to 1/2006. For an average cost of \$400 a buyer can obtain coverage for older systems. Warranty companies do vary on what they will insure. Buyers can negotiate a home warranty or a Seller can offer a warranty and in some application s will be covered under the policy while their home is on the market. Often a buyer will find that after taking ownership and needing to implement their warranty, it will not cover their older system, and they could encounter a \$5,000 to \$6,000 expense or more. A good insurance plan would be for the owner to renew their warranty up to five years. This would depend on the system age and if the owner can afford it.

The average life of a system is 12 to 15 years, with regular service that figure could double. The recent federal stimulus package creates advantages right now for tax credits on installation of energy efficient systems, visit energystar.gov.
