

President's Report

BSCL kicked off the Fall season with the September meeting that featured a very helpful update on the construction that continues on the National Guard Bureau and State Department facilities on George Mason Drive. The BSCL and the Alcova Heights Civic Association president heard a briefing from Arlington County staff on the current parking impact on nearby streets and other long term impacts. It was agreed that both Civic Associations will pursue an opportunity to meet with Guard Bureau staff to discuss better ways to accommodate the significant growth coming our way. More on this issue in the months to come.

The members also voted to authorize exterior painting and window repairs for the Community House. These repairs are very much in need, and are in fact required for historic properties like our Community House.

The **October 1st BSCL meeting** will be action packed. The Arlington Partnership for Affordable Housing (APAH) will be present to request BSCL endorsement of their request for Zoning Tax Amendment for Buchanan Gardens (S. Wakefield St and Columbia Pike), which is scheduled to go before the County Board in October. The BSCL has been supportive of APAH's effort to acquire and refurbish these apartments. If you have any questions or opinions about the APAH request please be sure to join us for this discussion. I anticipate that the members present will vote on a resolution of support after their presentation and BSCL membership discussion.

Another item that the members present will vote on is a proposal to increase BSCL dues to \$10 for an individual and \$15 per family. At the September Executive Committee meeting it was agreed that because the current dues rate is by far the lowest among all Arlington civic associations, and that costs associated with upkeep of the community house now outstrip our dues and rental income, an increase makes sense. It is noteworthy that BCSL dues have not seen an increase in many years.

The October meeting will also feature a "Meet and Greet" with County political office candidates on the November ballot. We will depart from out usual debate format and have brief remarks from the candidates followed by time for informal conversations. The November election includes a State Delegate seat, a County Board and School Board position. The candidates for Governor will not be joining us.

AROUND THE NEIGHBORHOOD

Tales from Barcroft By Kathy Kerr

It was great fun speaking recently with former Barcrofter, **Linda Boten**. She is the daughter of **Mildred (Millie) and Lee Hoskinson**. The Hoskinsons arrived in Barcroft in July, 1938 to their newly built home on 4th St. South between S. Pershing and S. Abingdon. They designed the house themselves and had it built to their specifications. Linda and her brother, **Gary** have many fond memories of growing up in a neighborhood that was filled with "trust and honesty" and where many of their neighbors to this day feel more like relatives and still maintain contact with each other, no matter where they live now.

For Linda, Barcroft meant roller skates, bikes, outdoor games and parents calling the kids in for dinner. It meant any number of "Mommies" up and down the street watching out for you and who could help if you scraped your knee. On the down side, misbehavior was soon reported to your parents since the parents all knew each other too.

All of the little kids attended Barcroft School. After school, Linda often walked over to the Barcroft Community House for Brownies and Girl Scout meetings, as well as lessons in tap dance, ballet and acrobatics!

Halloween was great fun. Trick or treating was very safe. Linda remembers that at many houses, the kids got homemade treats. Everyone knew who made what. She remembers the lady across the street who made wonderful ginger cookies. Millie's brownies are still legendary.

In the winter, the kids loved sledding in the street, down the thrilling little hill on 4^{th} St. S.

In 1968, Linda's father passed away, but her mother continued to live in the house. Millie was well known for her green thumb. She had incredible hydrangeas and some of the prettiest azaleas in Arlington. She was often found working in her yard and ready for a lively conversation. Millie was very active in in our community and also the Arlington Forest Methodist Church.

On Sunday, September 13, 1987 Millie went to church as she always did. While she was gone, a fire started inside her house. To this day, no one knows exactly what was the cause. Maybe it was faulty wiring on an electric alarm clock? Neighbors noticed smoke coming from the house. A heroic neighbor broke down her door to be sure that she wasn't home. However, another neighbor felt certain that Millie was not in the house because he peeked into the garage. Her car was not there and he knew that if the car was gone, she was gone.

The house was extremely well built with a brick exterior and solid, plaster walls. But everything inside the house was ruined either by fire, smoke, water or from the fire fighters efforts. Eventually the house was restored, sold to another wonderful Barcroft family and is still extremely well built! And many of Millie's plants yet reside in the yard, especially the hydrangeas.

In 1988, Millie moved to Leesburg to live with her sister. She passed away June 13, 2009 at the age of 98. Her son Gary currently resides in Falls Church. Her daughter Linda now lives in North Carolina but visits Barcroft friends from time to time and stops by to see her former home.

It's wonderful that much of what Linda remembers still goes on here in Barcroft!

Students Open Credit Union

Barcroft Elementary is one of the few schools in Arlington with a student-run branch of the Arlington Community Federal Credit Union. Selected 4th and 5th graders are trained to work as tellers, and students, staff and families can open an account and make deposits on Thursdays throughout the school year.

This year, the PTA is sponsoring two incentives to increase participation: a \$5 bonus for new accounts and a "cash match" program for regular depositors that will allow kids to earn up to \$5 if they deposit \$20 over the school year.

To help families teach their kids about money and saving, the PTA will host a Family Financial Literacy Night at the October 6th PTA meeting.

Kids Up And Running!

The new track has quickly become an integral part of school life – with laps being run during PE, recess and after school. Students are signing up for the **Marine Corps Healthy Kids Fun Run**, to be held **October 24th**. This is a one mile fun run, held in connection with the Marine Corps Marathon, for kids ages 6-13.

President Obama at Wakefield

The first day at **Wakefield** this year was marked by a school-wide assembly, featuring an address to the entire student body by President Barack Obama. The President visited Wakefield to deliver his nationwide address to students. His message was simple: stay in school, get a quality education and be the leaders and problem- solvers of tomorrow.

But before the President spoke to students and staff in the gym, he and U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan met with a small group of about 30 freshmen who had the opportunity to ask the President a variety of questions.

Five Barcroft 9th graders were among those who participated. Noelle Carlson was one of them. She says the students arrived at school, went through security and then waited for President Obama in the library. They were not allowed to take any photos. Several of the students were able to ask questions. Barcrofter Lilly Trone asked who Obama might have dinner with if he could chose any famous person in history. His answer was Mahatma Gandhi. Other students asked about health care issues and how to prepare to become President of the USA. One boy from a single family home asked how not having a father in his life had made Obama the man he is today. The President conversed candidly with the students for about 40 minutes. Some clips from this session appeared on CNN and are available on the internet including when Lilly asked her question. Other Barcrofters in the group included Max Rosenberg, Bou Dia and Matthew Chen.

A number of Barcroft students who attend Wakefield also made national TV as they were filmed while listening to Obama's speech in the school gym.



All About Trees

What to worry about, and what not to worry about

County Tree Stewards are embarking on a new program of Public outreach.

On **Sunday October 18th** you are invited to a free walk and talk on all things trees from 3 - 4pm. This walk is open to the general public. Please meet at 3pm in front of the Barcroft Community House. Minimal walking will be required.

We'll show you examples of planting the right tree in the right place, and discuss, for example, what trees are appropriate for planting under power lines. How close to my house or to the street can I plant my tree? Will tree roots damage my home's foundation?

We'll show examples in the close-by neighborhood and share information such as: Why mulch around trees, and how much mulch is the right amount? Should I choose a native or non-native tree? How much water does my newly planted tree versus my established mature tree need? How can trees save money on my air conditioning bill?

Real Estate Market Trends

The Northern Virginia Association of Realtors® reports on <u>August 2009 home sales</u> activity for Fairfax and Arlington counties, the cities of Alexandria, Fairfax and Falls Church and the towns of Vienna, Herndon and Clifton. A total of 1,813 homes sold in 8/09, a .06% increase above 8/08 home sales of 1,812.

Active listings decreased by 23.66% from last year, with 7,016 active listings in August 2009, compared with 9,190 active homes available in August 2008.

The average days on market (DOM) for homes in August 2009 decreased by 27.59% to 63 days, compared with 87 days in August 2008.

Sales prices remain lower than those realized last year. The average sales price in August 2009 fell by 3.17% from August 2008, to \$458,172, compared with last Augusts' average of \$473,183 in 2008.

The number of pending home sales in Northern Virginia in August 2009 shows an increase of 9.7 % at 2,070 compared to 1,887 in August 2008. Consumer confidence has been strong for home purchases in our local market. Most of the activity involves first time buyers targeting <u>affordable and bargain-priced properties in the</u> <u>lower price ranges</u>.

Buyers: It's a great time to buy! FHA loans up to\$729,750 with only 3.5% down are available to all qualified buyers, <u>not just first time buyers!</u>
