April BSCL President's Report

Arlington Partnership for Affordable Housing (APAH)

At our March meeting APAH staff (joined by County staff) provided a briefing on the request to "encroach" on Four Mile Run Park to construct their fire truck turnaround and a fenced tot lot for their tenants. The discussion helped us understand the details and express our concern about the apparent loss of parkland that adjoins our neighborhood. While the affected "parkland" is actually County "road right of way", this status did not assuage the frustration many of us feel. While I cannot speak for all who attended the meeting, there was a clear sense that we as a neighborhood had little say in the County process regarding losing the green, natural break between the Buchanan Gardens complex and the park.

The good news is that we provided input to the County Board's decision on the APAH encroachment application, and the Board's action included two important provisions:

- 1. APAH will not seek further encroachments in the right of way;
- 2. APAH will consult with BSCL on the landscaping plan for the area of encroachment, including maintenance of the encroachment area.

It is my feeling that APAH will need to rebuild the sense of trust with many in BSCL (myself included), and they did offer to provide updates on their renovation work and seek our input. When on the bike path, I will notice the open area that will be the fire truck turnaround, and keep in mind the need to be vigilant about unwanted changes to the park.

Randy Swart comments: "I was personally disappointed that parkland was lost, but it's just part of the cost that we all pay to encourage affordable housing."

An informed and active BSCL will play a key part in preventing repeats of this unfortunate episode. The County wants to establish a regular liaison with the BSCL. Volunteers should email me: bryant@bscl.org

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What's with all the construction on Columba Pike?

As part of the ongoing revitalization of Columbia Pike, construction is underway along Columbia Pike from S. Wakefield Street to Four Mile Run to relocate underground utilities. As of January 2011, construction crews have installed new water, sanitary sewer and gas utility lines in the middle of the road.

Work on the next phase of the project, which includes undergrounding the overhead telephone, electric and cable TV lines, has been temporarily halted in order to update the designs after a "subsurface conflict" was discovered. The County is actively working with Dominion Virginia Power and Verizon to redesign this phase and anticipates resuming construction on the utility undergrounding in late spring. The work will likely continue for about 6 months.

Streetscape improvements from S. Wakefield Street to Four Mile Run will be constructed after the utility phase is complete.

The County's construction contractor has restored the roadway pavement along this stretch of Columbia Pike. Base asphalt is being used and will allow for a safe driving surface. Upon completion of the street improvement phase of the project, Columbia Pike from South Wakefield Street to



South Four Mile Run will be milled and repaved.

The County aims to ensure the safety of all work crews and the community during this and other projects in the right-of-way. We can expect delays along the west end of Columbia Pike. Periodic lane closures will be necessary, however at least one lane in each direction will be open.

Several MetroBus and ART bus stops in the construction area have been temporarily closed and relocated. Although construction is temporarily halted in this area, the MetroBus and ART bus stops will remain in their current location to avoid confusion when the project resumes.

County staff will continue to work with businesses in the immediate area to ensure customers continue to have access during construction.



Born and raised in Michigan in the heart of the automobile industry, Barcroft neighbor, Thomas Crumm, recently published a book entitled: What Is Good for General Motors? -Solving America's Industrial Conundrum. The book describes the rise and fall of the U.S. auto industry — and what might be done to restore it to its former greatness.

A third-generation autoworker from Flint, Michigan, Tom's lifelong fascination with the auto industry began early. By age 10, he was already immersed in the blue versus white collar issues at family gatherings. Tom began as an industrial engineering student working in a tailpipe line. He rose through the ranks over the next 25 years. He was then asked to join the General Motor's think tank where he spent his next 11 years immersed in the struggles of succeeding Chairman of the Board all trying to alter the course of a collapsing giant.



Tom says he decided 2003, when he returned to Flint for his father's funeral. When he saw the devastation left behind by the implosion of GM he realized that, if he didn't put down on paper what he knew, the day was coming when no one would

remember the culture that built the world's greatest industrial sector.

Arlington Sales Prices are Up!

Sales data for major jurisdictions across Northern Virginia, based on figures reported Feb. 10 by Real Estate Business Intelligence:

Alexandria: Home sales for January totaled 114, the same number that sold a year before. The average sales price of all homes that sold during the month was \$444,599, up 11.8%, while the average sales price in the single-family-home sector was \$749,943. Total sales volume for the month was \$50.24 million, up 11%.

Arlington: Home sales totaled 129, down from 134 a year before. The average sales price of all homes that sold was \$506,005, up 2.4%, while the average sales price of single-family homes was \$682,250, up 5.1%. Total sales volume for the month was \$64.77 million, down 2.2%.

Fairfax County: Home sales totaled 636, down from 732 a year before. The average sales price of all homes that sold was \$440,938, up 1.8%, while the average sales price for single-family homes was \$614,278, up 2%. Total sales volume for the month was \$279 million, down 13.5%. Falls Church City: Home sales totaled eight, up from six a year before. The average sales price of all homes that sold was \$386,863, down 24.4%, the average sales price of single-family homes was

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\$660,000, up 26.5%. Total sales monthly

volume \$3.09 million, up 6.7%.

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
