Buchanan Gardens Rehab

The Arlington Partnership for Affordable Housing held a very informative briefing for Barcrofters on April 6. They are redeveloping Buchanan Gardens apartments on the hill where Buchanan St. meets Columbia Pike.

It was evident that APAH and its contractors have spent a lot of planning time attempting to reduce the impact of the construction on the neighborhood. They are renting a parking lot for their workers' cars, and they will keep the apartment parking open in evenings even when they excavate it for new utility lines. Trucks will enter and exit via Columbia Pike, not through the neighborhood, but you can expect some congestion on the Buchanan St. hill as they widen the sidewalks. They may be able to screen the temporary construction trailers from the park, and will be pulling back somewhat the existing fence that encroaches into the park after construction is finished in late 2012. They will adhere to Arlington rules on construction noise, and will not be driving pilings and shaking houses as the Arlington Mill construction is now doing. Residents will be moved between buildings as the construction progresses.

A Barcroft Brigadier General

John H. H. Turner, III, son of Lila Lane and the late Jack Turner of South 4th St. S, was recently promoted to the rank of Brigadier General in the US Army Reserves. The ceremony was held on January 22, 2011, in Houston, Texas, where John is the Deputy Commanding General of the 75th Battle Command Training Division.

John attended Wakefield High School and graduated from the United States Military Academy. In addition he holds Masters degrees from the University of North Carolina and the US Army War College. He was also a Fellow at the National Security Management School, Maxwell School of Citizenship & Public Affairs at Syracuse University.

After graduating from West Point John completed Airborne and Ranger training and

served in progressive command and staff assignments in Germany, Ft Knox, KY, and as a professor of history at West Point. During Operation Desert Storm John served both in Kuwait and Saudi Arabia. John transitioned from active duty to the US Army Reserves where again he continued to hold successive positions of increased responsibilities. John also was activated for ten months in 2004.

John and his wife MaryAnne Sirotko-Turner live and work in Atlanta, Georgia, where he is the Director, Division of Community Engagement at the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention. In attendance at the ceremony, in addition to Lane, were John's brother, Nathan, a VMI graduate and Desert Storm Veteran, and his sister Amy Johnson and their families.

Barcroft Tree Stewards in the Washington Post

On Sat, April 9, the Washington Post ran an article "Earlier Blooms Give Flower Lovers a Chill." It talked about plants and trees that are blooming earlier than they used to, and how that affects wildlife. For example the cherry blossoms along the Tidal Basin are blooming 6-9 days earlier than they did in the 1970s. The article included a photo of Barcrofters **Elizabeth Rives** and **Alison Willocks** who serve as tree stewards for our neighborhood. They have organized tree giveaways in the neighborhood, and Elizabeth presented a workshop "Right Tree, Right Place" on trees that do well in Barcroft.



Barcroft Peace Corps Volunteers

This year the Peace Corps is celebrating its 50th anniversary. Barcroft is now the home of quite a few former Peace Corp volunteers and probably some current ones as well! Here are a few of their stories.

Teresa Saunders and her husband **Dan Junker** volunteered in Fiji, but not at the same time. She was there from 1981 to 1983 and Dan was there from 1984 to 1987.

Ben Harris served in Honduras from 1994 -1996 and his wife **Jenny Lindenauer** was in Gabon from 1995-1997.

Vern Roningen was in Malawi, (the first group there) from 1963 to 1965.

Karen Darner served from 1988-1990 in Jamaica as a speech therapist with an organization that provided special education to children on the island. Most of the children did not go to any school. She also tested hearing for an ENT who agreed to help the children for free. Karen says: "I loved it all, by the way."

Don McKeon was a forester from 1974 to 1976 in Upper Volta, West Africa. It's now called Burkina Faso. He rode all over the Ouahigouya area on a small motorbike, setting up small tree plantations (mostly to provide villagers with firewood) and getting sunburned.

Julie Rotherham volunteered in Kyrgyzstan from 1997 – 1999. She says: "It was an exciting time in Central Asia. My primary assignment was teaching English in a school, but I had a lot of side projects too. I ran a baseball program, taught a Saturday teacher education program for my town, facilitated the distribution of 1500 pairs of eyeglasses donated from the US and organized and ran the first ever national civics education conference for educators. Julie currently serves on the Friends of Kyrgyzstan Board.

Andrew Hunter served in Togo 1982-85. He was in the animal traction project, introducing oxen into the farming system: training them to plough, transport, and weed--to take the place of hand hoe technology. He worked with the local agriculture extension agents, blacksmiths and veterinary services setting up the infrastructure so farmers could adopt the technology. He did that for two years then stayed on to train new volunteers. He lived in a little village with no running water and no electricity and got around to visit the farmers riding on a 125cc dirtbike. He says: "It was a wonderful time."

Will there perhaps be a Peace Corps contingent in the Barcroft 4th of July Parade?

Northern Virginia Market Trends

The Northern Virginia Association of Realtors® reports on February 2011 home sales activity for Fairfax and Arlington counties, the cities of Alexandria, Fairfax & Falls Church, & towns of Vienna, Herndon and Clifton.

A total of 1,017 homes sold in February 2011, a 5.48 % decrease from 1,076 home sales in February 2010.

Active listings on the market decreased 4% from last year, with 3,495 active listings in 2/11, compared with 3,645 homes available in 2/10. The average days on market (DOM) for February 2011 increased by about 43% to 77 days, compared with 54 days in February 2010

Sales prices rose compared with those realized last year. The average sales price for homes in Northern Virginia in February increased by about 6% from February 2010 to \$441,826, compared with last February's average of \$415,369. The number of new pending home sales in Northern Virginia in February showed an increase of about 24% at 1,640 compared to 1,326 new contracts pending in February 2010.
