BSCL President's Report and Special June Meeting

Our March meeting focused on the growth of the National Foreign Affairs Training Center and the Army National Guard Readiness Center at Rt. 50 and George Mason Drive. We held a joint meeting with the Alcova Heights Civic Association and met with representatives from the Centers and Arlington County. It was a tough discussion, which underscored the traffic and parking impact on our community.

The move of the National Guard Bureau (NGB) staff from Crystal City to the new

George Mason Drive facility is now underway, with over 1,000 additional staff in place by July. With one parking place on site for every four people, parking issues are sure to get more difficult.

Because this impact is upon us now, we are having a special June

meeting (we normally don't meet in June) with NGB, State Department and County staff to get an update on the move, steps they are taking to make it as smooth as possible, and to discuss working with the community. A working group of these staff has been established, and they joined us at our last meeting to hear the discussion with **Delegate Patrick Hope**. A staff member from **Congressman Moran's** office will join us to hear the June discussion to better understand the impact this move has on our community. As noted by many Barcrofters, there has been little if any attention paid by the media to date.

Please join us **Thursday June 2** for what I hope will be an open discussion with key staff

willing to collaborate with us. While they did not make any of the decisions on the move and the number of parking spots built at the new facility, they are left to work out the implementation. I ask that we have an honest and civil conversation as these folks are going above and beyond to try to help.

State Delegate Patrick Hope

Many thanks to Delegate Patrick Hope for joining us at our May meeting. He offered very interesting comments on the Legislative session in Richmond, particularly in light of

the hard budget environment and the redistricting process. He responded to questions, and intends to keep informed about the NGB growth and its impact on Barcroft. From my perspective, he is doing a terrific job and we are fortunate to have him working for us.

Final Notes

I've had a great experience as president these past two years, and want to thank all the neighbors who make so much happen. My two-year term expires this month. Unless you're involved (as many are) you might not know the time and effort folks put in on managing the Community House, the holiday events we love (July 4th Parade!) and the hard work on issues such as the 8th Street house fire. It's been my privilege to see first-hand this talent and hard work. Best wishes to the great slate of officers for the 2011-2012 year, including veteran BSCL leader **Pat Williamson**, our incoming president. Have a great summer! See you at the 4th of July Parade!

Foxes in Barcroft

The BSCL email chat list recently has had many fox stories—screaming in the woods, following dogs in the mating season, sunning themselves on neighbors' decks, baby foxes (called "kits") and horribly sick

About 6 months ago, Barcrofter **Carol Frisbie** saw a mangy, hairless fox in her yard in a very weakened condition. It was wintertime and her heart went out to this pitiful animal.

mangy-looking foxes.

She contacted the Animal Welfare League to see if anything could be done. Staff there directed her to a licensed wildlife rehabilitator named Erika Yery. Ms. Yery helps to coordinate some 400 volunteers throughout Northern Virginia who work to save foxes suffering from mange. Mange is caused by mites and is not contagious to humans or other animals. It causes constant intense burning and itching which results in loss of fur. Mange does not make the fox vicious or dangerous to humans, dogs and cats. Rather, these foxes are very weak and are unable to hunt for food. Thankfully, it's readily treatable with a veterinary serum, injected in a scrap of food (hotdog or piece of chicken).

Carol keeps the serum on hand, provided by the County wildlife center, and has recently successfully treated at least two foxes who were at the end of their strength. Their condition improved dramatically and quickly.

The sick foxes need to have 2 doses of the serum, about 2 weeks apart. Carol's property

extends down into the forest behind her house. She has established a small feeding area there away from people and pets, including her own dog. The foxes learn there is food there and

this makes it easy to inject the food with the serum and get them to eat it.

Carol reports that foxes are very timid and unaggressive. (Long Branch Nature Center staff does say that during mating season, foxes may follow dogs but are extremely unlikely to attack.) Foxes do not invade homes, do not attack cats or dogs and do no

damage. Their mouths are small so the largest animal they can hunt is the size of a rat. Carol notes that Arlington has a severe rat problem and that the foxes significantly help to reduce the rat population. Dogs and cats are simply too large for a fox to want to attack. Worried about rabies? The last CDC-verified case of a human contracting rabies from a fox in the entire USA was in 1961.

Carol says that foxes are "such beautiful and intelligent little animals that need our compassion as we squeeze them out of their woodland territory."

She adds: "Though normally timid and reclusive, foxes can sound like they're being murdered during mating season. Ah, Spring!"

Café Sazón

The word sazón, in the name of this new café, means "seasonings" in Spanish. It also means "to live life to the fullest." Adriana Torres, one of the café's owners, says they aim to bring a variety of spices and flavors to their food. And as for that part about living life, Adriana and her co-owners have thoughtfully transformed a once-nondescript space next to the Goodwill into a beautiful, contemporary coffee shop, bakery, and restaurant.

For a cup of coffee and a pastry, look no further. There's even a comfortable couch and free wi-fi to make you feel at home.

For those of you looking for a casual lunch or dinner, look to the chalkboards for the regular menu and an array of daily specials. As fellow Barcrofter **Alyssa Morel** said after her first bite of food, "small menu but big flavor." The predominantly Bolivian menu features items such as silpancho—pounded and breaded steak served over rice with two fried eggs, potatoes, and pico de gallo (\$7.75). I tried the

delicious chicken fajitas off the regular menu plated with two heaping piles of meat and peppers, a mound of herbed rice and a fresh salad of romaine lettuce and tomatoes (\$7.59). Also tasty were the enchiladas Hondureñas—layers of ground beef, cabbage, and hard boiled egg atop crispy tostadas (2 for \$5.49). The final daily special ordered was the bistec res, a generous pile of tender and flavorful slow-cooked beef, also served with rice and fresh salad

It's nice to have such a welcoming place in our neighborhood. Stop by and introduce yourself to the friendly staff. They'll help you navigate the menu and even provide a taste of their featured hot drinks. Try the api morado, a sweet drink made from crushed red corn. This past weekend they also served atol de semilla de marañon, rather like a smoothie made of cashews. It was homey and warming on a cold wet day.

The owners of this café are long term residents of Columbia Pike. Adriana grew up in Columbia Heights West and now she and another co-owner Tom Shen, have moved into Columbia Forest. She said they hope to create a welcome space for the community. Judging from what we've seen and tasted so far, they're well on their way. I hope you'll find it so as well.

Northern Virginia Market Trends

The Northern Virginia Association of Realtors® reports on March 2011 home sales activity for Fairfax and Arlington counties, the cities of Alexandria, Fairfax and Falls Church and the towns of Vienna, Herndon and Clifton.

A total of 1,437 homes sold in March 2011, a 7.71% decrease below March 2010 home sales of 1,557. Active listings decreased by 7% from 2010, with 3,975 active listings in 3/11, compared with 4,267 homes available in 3/10. The average days on market (DOM) for homes in 3/11 increased 39% to 71 days, compared with 51 days in 3/10. Sale prices rose compared with those realized last year. The average sales price in March 2011 increased 3% from March 2010, to \$448,957 from \$434,129 last March.

Arlington County Statistics comparing March 2010 to 2011: Condos - Avg. Sold Price was \$373,112 in 3/10 - up 13% in 3/11 to \$421,108. Single Family Attached - Avg. Sold Price was \$551,911 in 3/10 - up 18% to \$653,160 in 3/11. Single Family Detached - Avg. Sold Price \$712,483 in 3/10, up 3% to \$732,041 in 3/11. On 10/1/11 the current administration is proposing lowering the conforming loan amount from \$729,750 to \$625,500 for FHA, Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac housing loans.
