

Recently a Barcroft email chat list received a message that a neighbor vacationing in Spain was robbed at gunpoint and desperately needed money! Fortunately, most folks knew she was not even out of town.

Another Barcrofter hired a man to do some work. At first the man worked hard and with skill but the neighbor made the mistake of advancing him money. Despite numerous promises, he never returned to complete the work.

If you suspect that you or a neighbor are being scammed, contact the Arlington Police at 703-558-2222

RED FLAGS —Things to look out for:

- Trucks with no business name
- Solicitors without an Arlington County vendors license which is a card that includes a photo ID
- Invoice not pre-printed with business name
- Solicitor staying they are from the utility company but have no vehicle, uniform or credentials
- Asking for full payment before work is done
- Offering a price too good to be true
- Asking for rides to the bank for withdrawals

Letter To The Editor — Streetcars Desired?

Dear Editor:

I just read Bryan Steckler's comments [Sun Gazette, January 26, 2012] on the Columbia Pike streetcar being a necessity. He certainly covered a lot of issues, but he is out of touch with reality. Let me take the items one at a time.

"Costs of the streetcar are a bargain compared to money that would be spent on sprawl throughout Arlington." What money would be spent on sprawl throughout Arlington without a streetcar on Columbia Pike? \$0, zero, nada. The savings would be great if we did NOT pursue the trolley system?

"Reduce money spent on road repair." The road repairs will be more expensive because you have to work around the tracks and because more traffic will use the non-railed part of the street. He obviously has not been around streetcars; I have.


"Reducing money spent on constructing and maintaining utilities to the suburbs." You do have to electrify the streetcar route were ever it goes, even in the repair yards where ever they are. Whatever utilities we need are already there on Columbia Pike. I don't think a trolley system will reduce or enhance them.

"Reduce personal transportation expenses." Not a chance in the world unless you make the cost of riding the streetcar FREE which is never going to happen.

"Promote dense development in a way that increased bus service will not." The density issue is not related to streetcars or buses. Arlington has already put in place a density

policy which appears to be the denser the better.

"Streetcar will add needed transit capacity to the Pike." The capacity of the Pike



ment called streetcars. What happens to the riders when an accident occurs? "Aid in pedestrian friendly environment." How

will a trolley or a bus will make a difference as far as pedestrians go? Sidewalks for pedestrians and streets for busses, cars, etc.

"Provide other transit options other than automobiles." We do have a lot of busses which seem to meet our needs. They provide flexibility for public transportation riders which trolleys do not. Automobiles will always be there. If people are satisfied with "public" transportation, they would not be driving.

Just for the readers info, I grew up with a streetcar in front of my house. The tracks for that streetcar, and all the others in Chicago, are now buried in the streets. The streetcar tracks are buried in DC and in Philadelphia. Do we know something that these cities didn't? A streetcar in the sky might do a lot more for moving people through Arlington and Fairfax. It would not be impeded by snow, sleet, freezing rain or heavy traffic. It did the trick for Disney Land, Disney World and does the trick in Tokyo. It is monorail, but we could call it Sky Metro.
