A Walk Around the Neighborhood

Need an alternate destination to encourage a walk around the neighborhood as the weather gets colder? The Holy Martyrs of Vietnam Catholic Church, on 9th Street South between Wakefield and Taylor, is a destination worth looking at during several seasons.

Over the past several years during the Christmas season, a congregational member has set up a larger-than-life-size nativity scene. They follow the tradition of having the Jesus infant figure not appear until Christmas Eve. But the rest is lit up and is a dramatic sight through the weeks before Christmas.

The same parking lot area, facing 9th

Street, has a Stations of the Cross display, with the carvings offering a Vietnamese expression of those iconic images.

They also have a small outdoor garden area which is decorated in warmer weather with a creative assortment of colorful potted flowers and greenery. It appears to be set up as a reflective space, in honor of Vietnamese martyrs, clergy and lay Catholics from early in the Catholic Church's history in that country. It is an attractive quiet space, culturally different than ones many of us are more familiar with.

Altogether, it is worth visiting a different corner of the neighborhood to experience the creativity of this local house of worship! •

Flavors of the Season: Peppermint

Packages of candy canes are everywhere this month; their festive red-and-white stripes and wintery peppermint flavor inspire this month's recipe. Homemade marshmallows make lovely gifts (especially dipped in white or dark chocolate), are amazing in hot chocolate, and can be a welcome low-fat and gluten-free addition to dessert tables or cookie exchanges.

Candy Cane Marshmallows

Vegetable-oil cooking spray

2 cups sugar

1 tablespoon light corn syrup

4 packages (1/4 oz each) unflavored gelatin*

3/4 teaspoon peppermint extract

2 large egg whites

5-10 drops red food coloring Powdered sugar for dusting

1. Coat a 9x13 pan with cooking spray; line bottom with parchment paper. Coat the parchment with cooking spray. Put sugar, corn syrup, and 3/4 cup water in a small saucepan.

Cook over medium heat, stirring, until sugar is dissolved. Stop stirring; let mixture come to a boil. Raise heat to medium-high; cook until mixture registers 260 degrees on a candy thermo meter.

2. Meanwhile, sprinkle gelatin over 3/4 cup water in a heatproof bowl; let stand 5 minutes to soften. Set the gelatin bowl over a pan of simmering water; whisk constantly until gelatin is dissolved. Remove from heat, and stir in extract.

3. With an electric mixer (whisk attachment), beat egg whites until stiff peaks form. Whisk gelatin mixture into sugar mixture; with mixer running, gradually add this to egg whites. Mix on high speed until very thick, 12 to 14 minutes.

4. Drop a few dots of food coloring into the marshmallow mixture; fold just a few times with a rubber spatula to swirl, and then pour into lined pan. Let marshmallow stand, uncovered, at room temperature until firm, at least 3 hours

or overnight. Cut into squares.

5. The cut sides will be sticky, so lightly toss in powdered sugar to dry them. Pour some powdered sugar on a plate and gently roll/press cut sides into the sugar. Then toss the marshmallow between your hands a

few seconds to shake excess off. Makes about 4 dozen yummies.

Overwintering Your Garden

It is now getting colder and which means that you need to start to close down your garden. Overwintering your garden can be a long or a short process depending on how big your garden is. You should try some of these tips. Just remember even professional gardeners lose some plants trying to over winter them.

This time of the year perennials are on sale because it is the end of the planting season. Take advantage of the discounted prices because you can plant the perennials in the fall and then during the fall and winter they will have a chance to get rooted and be even bigger in the spring.

If you like to grow throughout the winter you could build or buy a greenhouse, using something that light can go through such as glass or plexi-glass.

Also, you want to make sure that you give your plants extra protection. You can add mulch on top of your plants but it is better to put wood chips or straw on your plants because the mulch will decompose over the winter.

If you have a sunroom or grow light then bringing you plants inside is an option. You can also add art to the garden, bringing color and a fun look. Hope that overwintering is successful for you and your plants.

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

Make Bird Feeding Healthy and Safe for Birds

Many of us feed the birds in the fall and winter. You can actually feed birds all year round but this is the most popular time of year to put out feeders. We should keep in mind, though, that we feed birds because we enjoy seeing birds around our homes – they rarely depend on feeders for survival.

Since we feed birds for our enjoyment, I believe we are ethically bound to make it as healthy and safe for the birds as possible. By offering food in feeders, we cause birds to concentrate unnaturally, exposing them to possible disease and predation. There are steps we can take, however, to reduce the risks to birds visiting our feeders and bird baths.

One of the most important things we can do to keep birds healthy is to regularly clean bird feeders and bird baths. The National Audubon Society recommends cleaning feeders at least twice a year and more often if you offer food during the summer. You should also inspect your feeders when refilling seed to make sure no damp seed is clumping in them. Damp, clumping seed can become moldy and should be discarded right away.

Use a hose sprayer, dish detergent, and a brush to scrub your feeders, followed by soaking them in a 10% solution of non-chlorine bleach. Rinse them well and allow them to dry thoroughly before refilling. Also, be sure to clean under your feeders occasionally by raking up spilled seed and seed hulls. These can be-

come moldy and sicken birds that eat them. Waste seed on the ground can also attract rats.

Keep your bird bath clean as well. Bird baths should be emptied and refilled every day or two and any algae scrubbed off the bottom. Frequent water changes provide healthier water for birds and get rid of mosquito larvae, which is good for both birds and us!

Where you place your feeders (and birdbaths) is an important safety consideration. Two things to keep in mind when locating bird feeders are windows and cover. Windows are a collision hazard for birds, so your feeders should be either within three feet of or more than thirty feet away from windows.

Feeders should be placed near shrubs, small trees or other cover so that birds have a chance to escape from hawks and other predators. However, feeders shouldn't be so close to cover that a predator can use it to ambush birds. If you have multiple feeders, it's a good idea to spread them out so that the birds are less concentrated.

Feeding birds and letting your cat outdoors is likely to end badly for the birds. If you have a confirmed outdoor cat, try to keep it inside until after breakfast and get it back in before dinner so that it's not outside during twilight hours when birds are most vulnerable.

What's going on at Our Savior Lutheran School (OSLS)


