SHOULD YOU VOTE FOR THESE BOND ISSUES?

Bond funding can make sense when the County can borrow at low rates (as it can now), and when the projects funded are permanent improvements which many future generations will enjoy and should therefore be willing to pay for through their taxes. On the other hand, too much bond funding can create budget deficits in the future, and those future generations might appreciate us more if we paid for the improvements now out of current taxes. Take your pick.

In November each voter will be able to influence the course of events in Arlington County by voting yes or no on the following new bond issues:

#### Library Expansion

Expansion of the Central Library would include construction of new space and improvement of the existing facility; bond money could finance up to \$10,835,000 of these costs. Funds for the new parking facilities and any necessary relocation or improvement of adjacent public facilities would also be funded.

#### Community Conservation

For over 20 years, the County has supported coordinated neighborhood improvements to older residential and commercial areas through the Neighborhood Conservation Program. This year \$4,025,000 in bond financing is proposed for community improvements like curb, gutter and roadway construction, park development, lighting, utility relocation and land acquisition. Projects funded by this program are often initiated by local residents and community organizations.

#### Parks and Recreation

The County proposes \$4,895,000 in bond funding for park and recreation improvements. Financing would include acquisition of open space to add to existing parks and for creation of small urban parks in Metro corridors. Construction and improvement of recreation and community facilities, as well as Arlington County's contribution to the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority would also be financed.

#### Transportation

Bond financing up to \$4,315,000 would be directed toward the cost of acquiring, constructing, improving and landscaping county streets, highways and pedestrian and bikeways. Relocation of utilities underground on Columbia Pike is among the projects proposed to receive bond financing. {The editor's personal choice among these proposals is the study to find a route to fill the bikeway gap at Shirley Highway, where the Four Mile Run trail should continue under the highway.}

These bond questions will be included on the November 4 ballot along with our local Congressional, County Board and Commonwealth Attorney races. You may want to save your <a href="Barcroft News">Barcroft News</a> to take along with you to the polls!

#### BARCROFT SUPPORTS FUNDING FOR

#### COLUMBIA PIKE GROUP

At our September meeting Mr. Ralph Perrino of the Columbia Pike Revitalization Organization appeared to tell us all about the activities of the group and to appeal for support for CPRO's funding request to the County Board.

CPRO's effort began in 1984 and has progressed through the early stages of gathering a group of interested citizens, developers, landowners, taxpayers and businesspeople, to the formulation of plans for the improvement of "The Pike." The goal is to promote a nicer environment for all who use this central South Arlington thoroughfare through:

- \* Land Use and Zoning \* Streetscaping
- \* Community Facilities (Post Office and Fire Station)
- \* Parks and Plazas
- \* Neighborhood Conservation

These measures should arrest the decline and stagnation of The Pike's recent years, and make the use of it more pleasant for all of us.

Mr. Perrino spoke eloquently of the plans which CPRO will pursue. The organization now needs an appropriation of \$50,000 from the County Board to make its first year budget of \$82,000.

Members of the BSCL generally were supportive of the group's goals. (Two members, Anne Noll and Susan Sarcone, have been working with the group as Barcroft's representatives.) The group groaned at the mention of the new townhouses being crammed into one section between George Mason Drive and Glebe Road, applauded Mr. Perrino's efforts and enthusiasm, and voted to support the CPRO request before the County Board on September 20th.

#### CIVIC FEDERATION NEWS

Barcroft's own Pat Roach has been appointed to the Civic Federation's Executive Committee. Congratulations, Pat! The Civic Federation is the "umbrella" organization which unites all of Arlington's civic associations, including our own BSCL. Its support was a key element of our defense of the Barcroft plans for the piece of Arlington Hall which lies west of George Mason Drive, and it is an asset for Barcroft to have a member of the Executive Committee.

#### SURVEY OF BARCROFT HOUSES

You may have noticed people with note pads and cameras standing in front of your home during the past few months. It is likely that they were neighbors participating in the first phase of an historic survey of Barcroft homes.

With start-up help from the Arlington Historical Society, a group of Barcroft residents began compiling data on the architectural styles of houses in our neighborhood. The initial survey area includes the oldest part of our community--the streets within roughly a two block radius of the Barcroft Community House at 8th and Buchanan Streets. Beyond this area some interested residents in other parts of the neighborhood have completed survey forms on their own homes.

The survey forms, created by the State Landmark Review Board, record information about age, style, special characteristics of a structure and anecdotal data about past residents and events associated with the home. The Arlington County Historical Affairs and Landmark Review Board has been very interested in our survey, which hopefully will serve as a pilot project to be undertaken in other Arlington neighborhoods.

Before launching the expansion of the Barcroft News the BSCL was forced to put together a new budget to determine if funds were adequate. Phyllis Kinsey chaired the committee, which included Donna Anderson, Tonie Copeland, Randy Swart, and Jack Turner. The Budget Committee's recommendations were approved by the BSCL Board in July and by the membership in the September meeting. The BSCL's total budget for 1986-7 will be \$4,117. This includes the cost of the expanded newsletter.




the eyes of her three children and appreciates sharing her heritage with them.
