

PLEASE FILL OUT YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD QUESTIONNAIRE !

By the time you read this the Block Captain for your area will have already handed you a copy of the Barcroft neighborhood questionnaire. If not, panic now! Call Pat Roach at 920-8131 and he will get one to you.

There are lots of questions on the questionnaire, because it is the primary means of finding out what you, the residents of Barcroft, want for your neighborhood in coming years, and that means asking you about practically everything in your environment. You will guickly find out that the questions are not really complicated, however, since they deal with things you experience every day. You will not have to do research, look up records, call your accountant or hold a committee meeting. You can probably check off boxes right down the line, and add comments as you wish, without too much heavy work. We encourage you to skip any questions you do not want to answer for any reason.

The questionnaire is very important for establishing a base for the Neighborhood Conservation Plan. The percentage of response directly affects the weight the County Board will give to anything in the Plan, including our views on the condition of our sidewalks and roads, noise, traffic, new townhouse development, eyesores, law enforcement, streetlights, bus service and a raft of other things.

Our goal is to achieve the highest possible response rate, including all 1244 of Barcroft's addresses. That includes you, whether you live in an apartment, townhouse, or single-family house. It includes renters, owners, businesspeople and everybody else in the neighborhood. Even if you rent and expect to move, the next tenant will be better off because of your answers to the guestions in the guestionnaire. The active members who are working hard on preparation of this plan are depending on you to do your part. Check those boxes!

If you ever hope to promote your views on what our neighborhood should be, this is the time. Fill our your questionnaire, and return it to your Block Captain.

Tucked away in the Arlington Forest shopping center right across Arlington Boulevard is a new gem of a local restaurant called Forest Pizza.

Forest Pizza is a pleasant, airy place with a decor which features natural light wood furniture and green plants. The effect is very nice, and the restaurant is spotlessly clean.

Although the name does not tell all, the Forest Pizza menu features a full range of choices, from simple sandwiches to full course dinners including Italian and Middle Eastern specialties. There is something for every taste, whether you chose a sub, veal parmigiana, pasta or some other specialty.

Even among these many dishes, it is the pizza which reigns supreme. Forest Pizza pizza is real pizza. ARLINGTON'S "BAG LADIES" FILL BAGS OF CHRISTMAS CHEER.

The Bag Ladies of Arlington are a group of 60 ladies, several from Barcroft, who fill bags of Christmas presents for needy children.

The group began in 1982 with Arlington resident Kaye McMarlin (affectionately known as "The Head Bag Lady"). With the help of friends, two bags were filled the first year. The effort has grown by leaps and bounds. In 1986 eighteen children received presents. Each bag consists of a good basic wardrobe (everything but shoes) as well as "fun" gifts. The goal for 1987 is to have bags for at least 20 kids.

The ladies work hard all year getting ready: shopping at sales, sewing, securing donations and discounts from stores, and always looking for new Bag Ladies. 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DARK STAR PARK: "STONEHENGE IN ARLINGTON"

Next time you enter Rosslyn on Fort Myer Drive (from Arlington Boulevard) look closely at the park just before your descent into the cold formality of Rosslyn's canyon architecture. It's a delightfully playful park which features huge concrete balls which look like they might just roll down into the huge concrete pipes lying downhill. And there are some neat perspectives to be seen by looking through the pipes, which are precisely aimed to bring the balls and some other things to your In all, it forms a nifty buffer eye. for the formality of Rosslyn's high rise buildings, and an attempt to make those formal buildings fit better into warm, friendly Arlington.

But perhaps the neatest thing of all about Dark Star is the formation of stone shafts which grace the park at the Arlington Boulevard end. Each shaft is matched by a shadow laid out on the ground at an exact angle. On August 1, 1860, the owners of the property signed a deed selling it to new owners, who called it Dark Star Farm. (It had previously belonged to the Ross family, who named it Ross Lyn in the Scottish style. That accounts for the two s's in the name.) To add a druidic element to the park, the shadows from the poles and the shadows laid on the ground line up precisely at 9:32 AM every year on August 1st. А few souls who appreciate things druidic congregate there on the appointed date to see the magic happen. Come and see if it really does! August 1st is a Saturday this year. The Farmer's Market at the Courthouse is open before and after 9:32, so get out your bicycle or car and do some Arlington exploring in August.



LOCUSTS WON'T HURT YOUR TREES MUCH BUT GYPSY MOTHS WILL

The loud sound of cicadas ("seventeen year locusts") in Barcroft has drowned out the quieter threat of the gypsy moth for now, but the cicadas do not eat tree leaves, and will be gone shortly for another 17 years. Gypsy moths will be with us still, and they do denude trees of leaves. This year you should have a band of burlap or other cloth around the trunk of your tree, and be looking under it every morning for the gypsy moth caterpillars hiding there for the day. Pick them off and kill them. Take the band off your tree at the end of June. A sample band is on the little oak tree in front of 4649 Second Street South. Anne Noll reports finding "thousands" of the caterpillars under bands she put around her big oaks last year.

on the day BEFORE your regular refuse collection day. It is not available for brush generated by commercial tree companies, and the brush must not contain metal. If you wish, you can


The County will now pick up unbundled brush, shrubbery trimmings, stumps and tree branches at your curb. The new service is arranged by calling 558-2321
