OCTOBER 1 MEETING : MEET THE ELECTION CANDIDATES AND HEAR ABOUT THE NEW TRASH CANS

October's BSCL meeting will be something special! The meeting will begin at 7:30 SHARP to discuss the new trash cans the County wants Barcroft residents to accept (see article on page 2). Trash collection is probably one of the guts issues for any neighborhood, and the first areas in Arlington to receive the new cans had big meetings beforehand to debate their merits. We will have comments from some of the early users to answer your questions about how well the cans work.

At 8:00 the meeting will change to Candidates' Night. The candidates for the County Board, State Assembly and State Senate will be on hand to make a short 4 minute statement and then answer your questions. This is your chance to be an informed voter this year with a face-to-face understanding of who you are voting for. Reading the Washington Post or the Northern Virginia Sun is certainly no substitute for asking that politician why he or she supports a certain view, and watching closely as they respond. We are keenly appreciative that all eight candidates for the various offices have agreed to attend, and hope that Barcroftians will turn out in numbers to make it worthwhile for all of us.

THE TRASH CAN COMETH -- DO YOU WANT ONE?

First there was Snow White and her Prince. Now there is the woman who has blissfully encountered an Eagle-cart trash can in her yard; obviously her Prince Charming. Such is the photo on the front of the brochure the County is sending to Arlington homes to promote the latest in trash collection. The brochure actually proclaims that with these new cans "A Dream Comes True."

For the past year, a number of Arlington neighborhoods have been using a new kind of trash can called the Eagle-cart. Perhaps you have seen the large, 2-wheeled carts lining the curbs in various neighborhoods outside of Barcroft. (Alcova is the nearest to us, between Glebe Road and George Mason.) The Utilities Dept. plans to eventually offer the trash carts to everyone in Arlington. So far most people seem to prefer them to the old cans.

Residents in the northwest corner of Barcroft will be receiving the option to use the cans very soon (not in April, as the "Prince Charming" brochure states). Why not the entire neighborhood? Because refuse collection "Route 5" is next on the County list, and it includes only a part of Barcroft. (This explains why trash on one side of certain streets may be picked up in the early morning while the other side is not collected until afternoon.) If you are not on Route 5 your Eagle-cart conversion time will come later on, perhaps next year.

There is no cost for the first Eagle--cart; people wishing to have more than one will have to pay \$3.00/quarter on their utility bill. Residents will be given an Eagle-cart unless they notify Public Works they don't want it. The County will notify you that the carts are coming by mail--first the Prince Charming brochure and then apparently something else with more specifics. In the brochure, the County promises quieter and faster trash pick-up. The light-weight, wheeled carts are said to reduce back injuries for both residents and trash collectors; there is a special "power-hoist" on the garbage trucks to lift the Eagle-carts. The carts hold the equivalent of 3-4 ordinary refuse containers. The latch is designed to discourage animals. The tops are attached to the cart so no more trash can tops would be strewn on the sidewalk to trip unwary pedestrians or blow down the street. The new carts will "virtually eliminate SPILTH--the spilled refuse that constitutes most of the litter in the County."

The brochure does not tell you how to get the cans up and down steps, or if the wheels will roll across a muddy yard. The carts are large and may be difficult for elderly persons to handle. A woman at the County Utilities Department did admit that some residents find the carts difficult to store during the week due to their size. For example, people in townhouses may not have a discreet place to stash the king-size can.

You can keep using your old cans if you prefer to. You can also try one of the new cans and later decide to return it and go back to your old one. And services such as setting out cans for the handicapped or elderly will continue unchanged. So this decision is not going to change your life, but you might like to know more about it.

Should you accept one of the new cans or stick with your old ones? The BSCL will hold a half hour discussion on that topic at the October 1st meeting featuring comments by residents of one of the neighborhoods who have been using the new cans. The trash can discussion will begin at 7:30 sharp and end at 8:00 to begin Candidates' Night.

For more information from the County, call the Utilities Department at 558-2321. We will ask the County to send a representative to the meeting on October 1st as well.

Arlington's Best Kept Secrets

THE OLDEST HOUSE IN ARLINGTON

Did you guess where the oldest house is? Did you guess Mount Vernon, or Arlington House? Of course not. You knew all along that the oldest house in the County is the John Ball house, now known as the Ball-Sellers House, located just across Four Mile Run in Glencarlyn neighborhood at 5620 Third Street South.

John Ball, an early Arlington settler, built the house about 1750. He was a tailor for, among others, George Washington. The house is prized as our only example of an ordinary working person's home from that period. The original section was a log cabin, and you can still see the original logs through a glass cutout in the board siding which was added later. The floors are worn, and the doors are low. The original roof was of boards, not shingles, and has been covered by another roof above it to preserve it.

The Ball Sellers House is preserved by the Arlington County Historical Society. It is opened at various times during the year for special occasions, or may be seen by calling the caretakers, Jay and Lynn Windsor, at 998-7686.




The Ball-Sellers House



COUNTY POLICE ENCOURAGE NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

Streets in Barcroft which have not yet organized Neighborhood Watch but feel it is needed should take advantage of the Arlington County Police Department's new push to encourage the formation of Neighborhood Watch groups.

Neighborhood Watch is an organized program of looking out for your neighbors to prevent burglaries and other crimes. The police department conducts a security survey of the homes in the area, instructs on how to mark property with identification numbers to discourage theft, and encourages the residents not to hesitate to call the County police department any time you see suspicious characters around or observe what may be a burglary in the making. When the program is in place, the County will install those nasty Big Eye signs for a reasonable \$37 each, paid for by collecting small amounts from the residents participating.

The responses on the Barcroft questionnaire indicate that some who have Neighborhood Watch in their part of the neighborhood are impressed with the results, and some are not. Nobody regretted having the program, however, and some said with enthusiasm that they consider it an important first line of defense against crime on their street.


