Arlington County police had told the victims that they were seeing a pattern of such incidents, some of them related to gangs active in the area over behind Safeway making their way to Barcroft. WHAT'S GOING ON WITH ARLINGTON HALL?

The <u>Post</u> and the <u>Journal</u> have carried a flurry of confusing articles recently about plans for Arlington Hall. What's really going on?

The State Department and National Guard are developing site plans, which will be reviewed by the National Capital Planning Commission. As we learned at the September meeting of the BSCL, State was planning to renovate the existing building on the west side (our side) of George Mason for a day care center for its staff, with the rest of the west side for parks and recreation. Some of the main part of the site on the east side of George Mason also will be available for parkland, but not as much as the County staff had hoped.

Both Congressman Wolf and Arlington County reacted strongly to the draft site plan. County Board Chairman John Milliken reminded State of its past promises to Barcroft and Alcova neighborhoods to set aside land for parks. Congressman Wolf sent a strongly worded letter to the Secretary of State. It was great to see our elected representatives going to bat for Barcroft!

The State Department has now decided to put the day care center on the main part of the site, leaving the entire 7 acre western parcel in the Barcroft neighborhood for parkland. About six acres on the eastern part of the site will be for parks, with a bike/walking trail running east and west connecting Barcroft with the Thomas Jefferson Center. The National Guard is planning to landscape and build a north-south bike/walking trail on their part of the site along the east side of George Mason Drive.

The State Department planners want to meet with interested Barcrofters during the last week of October to discuss their plans, and to talk about what our new park on the west side should look like. Anyone who would like to participate in this discussion should call Pat Roach at 920-8131.

RADON TEST RESULTS NEEDED FOR UPDATE

LEAF COLLECTION

Leaf collection begins on Halloween. If you have leaves to get rid of, just rake them up and leave them at your curb. The County will come by and vacuum them up. No bags needed. There are three sweeps per season, running from west to east, ending in late December. We are in leaf collection Zone 11, and your leaves will be vacuumed just after they do Arlington Forest to our west. Check the schedules on Cable Channel 31. or by calling the Public Works number for Utilities, currently 558-2321. (In mid-November it will change to 358-3636.) Snow or rain delays the vacuuming. Arlington County uses the leaves for mulch, which you can pick up or get delivered in the spring.

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AROUND THE NEIGHBORHOOD with Kathy Kerr

JOMO MULHOLLAND IS MASTER OF THE CHINESE SPORT OF WUSHU

We Barcrofters can be very proud of our neighbor Jomo Mulholland, son of Joan Mulholland on S. Taylor St. Jomo, who is 18, was selected as one of 16 participants from across the USA to compete in the Wushu Festival to be held in China in mid-October. Fortyseven countries are sending representatives to compete in this exciting and beautiful Chinese sport, which appears to an outsider as a cross between martial arts and gymnastics. Routines are choreographed using swords and staffs. Body control is essential. Unlike martial arts there is no body contact though the swords or staffs may touch. Wushu may become a part of the Summer Olympic games in the year 2000 when the games will be held in China and China can add two sports.

Of the 16 USA participants going to China this year, 3 are from Arlington. They all learned the sport at Thomas Jefferson and Gunston Community Centers when Wakefield H.S. graduate Chris Pei (pronounced Pay) began coaching them as a drop-in volunteer. Five years of volunteer coaching later, coach Pei will be joining his protegees in China.

The cost of sending the three Arlington representatives and their coach to China is very, very high as you can imagine. Consider also that one of the participants is a Vietnamese refugee. And Jomo is Barcroft's own!! At our October meeting the BSCL members voted to support and encourage this high achievement of one of our neighbors and donated \$25. The Mulholland family has lived in Barcroft for 18 years. All five boys attended Glenwood Preschool in our Barcroft Community House. They went on to Barcroft school, then to Kenmore, Wakefield or HB Woodlawn schools. Three of them, including Jomo, are now in college. Joan reports that she attended Glenwood Preschool herself as a child but it was then located in Buckingham.

GYPSY MOTH COUNT IS DOWN

Official Arlington County Gypsy Moth sleuth Jamie Bartalon has been poking around Barcroft yards and peering up Barcroft trees in search of gypsy moth egg masses. The good news is that he isn't finding very many and it appears that we will NOT need to be sprayed this spring. Jamie does encourage us to search our yards now for egg masses and report any significant findings (over 10 masses) to him. Otherwise, we should just plan on putting back up the infamous burlap traps in May. Jamie can be reached at 358-6400 if you have egg masses to report or have any questions.
