## FEBRUARY MEETING: WHAT SHOULD THE COUNTY BE DOING ABOUT THE VEPCO SITE?

In last month's issue we discussed the status of the old Virginia Power substation site on Pershing Drive between 4 th and 6 th Streets (where the curve to Buchanan starts). Virginia Power has vacated the site because the substation was no longer needed. There is now a good-sized piece of land-about two building lots--located next to the County parkland which runs from Pershing Drive down to Four Mile Run.

Some BSCL members have noted that there is no paved access path for Barcroft residents to Four Mile Run between 9th Street South and Arlington Boulevard. The old VEPCO site might make an ideal place to start a trail down to Four Mile Run, and the BSCL has asked to County to consider purchasing the property. Our February 2nd meeting will be devoted to a discussion of that subject, and we hope to have a speaker from Parks to enlighten us.

Since this meeting will be held on Groundhog Day, there will probably be some discussion of whether or not we will have six more weeks of winter. (By tradition, spring is here if the Groundhog does not see its shadow.)

Don't miss the meeting. This is one meeting you can walk to if it snows! As always, the meeting starts at 7:30 PM on the first Thursday of the month, and is held at the Barcroft Community House, 800 South Buchanan Street. Look for Jack Taylor's signs on the morning of meeting day.

## NATIONAL GUARD TO BEGIN CONSTRUCTION ON THEIR PIECE OF ARLINGTON HALL SITE

National Guard representatives came to our January meeting to present plans for their part of the Arlington Hall site (along George Mason Drive).

The Guard building will be their new national headquarters. It will be an office building, not an armory. The architecture will be modern and severe on the outside, but the main buildings will be only three stories, and partly screened from view by plantings.

There will be more greenery on the Guard's part of the site than at present. The barbed wire fence will be replaced by an ornamental case iron fence and plantings. The old temporary buildings will be razed.

There will be three entrances, two on George Mason and the other one from Arlington Boulevard. A total of 750 parking spaces will be provided, so the Guard employees will not be parking on Barcroft streets. The 400 cars using the George Mason entrances are not expected to disrupt traffic.

Construction on one building starts soon. The demolition of the old tempos will be a problem, since they contain asbestos and PCB's. The National Guard will return to a spring meeting of the BSCL to describe their plans for controlling environmental pollution during the demolition phase.

Next month we will have an update on the State Department's plans for its share of the site, which will cover a larger part than the National Guard buildings.

Parents of preschoolers are probably aware that if their child will be attending preschool in the Fall, the time is NOW to get them signed up. There are quite a number of preschools available in Arlington with one of the finest right here in Barcroft.

Arlington Unitarian Church Preschool (AUCP) has been teaching children now for some 20 years. Ann Marie and Vinnie Millin on S. Pershing are one of many Barcroft families who have had children attend the school. Currently 4 year old Vickie is enrolled. Their older daughter Nina, now in 6th grade at Drew, is a graduate of AUCP.

Ann Marie says the school was started in 1969 as an extension of the church Sunday school program. A local pediatrician, Dr. Bridge, assisted the organization of the school and favored the Montessori approach. Montessori teaching involves a variety of play equipment to teach specific skills. The teacher is a guide. The present program is a known as "modified Montessori" which means the philosophy is a less rigid and there are more group activities.

Arlington's best playground is a part of the school. It is located behind the Unitarian Church building and was designed by parents and children working with well-known architect and designer Bob Leathers. Leathers has helped groups throughout the country to build ingenious, exceptionally fun playgrounds. The playground here in Barcroft was built in 1983. It was rather like an oldtime barn-raising with lots of people working together. A sign bearing Dr. Bridge's name dedicates the playground to him.

Ann Marie picked this school for her daughters in part because it is so nearby. But mainly what she likes are the excellent teachers and the stimulating projects and activities available. Being a co-operative school, there is considerable parent
involvement. Parents are required to work frequently in their child's classroom. They also must volunteer for administrative positions. Like most families in the school, Ann Marie and Vinnie take turns fulfilling the requirements. If both parents are working full time, most will alternate taking time off from work to be a part of the school program.

The AUCP serves children age 2-5 with 2 and 3 day programs (9:30 am to 12:30 $\mathrm{pm})$ and a 4th day enrichment class for children about to enter Kindergarten. 4 year old Vickie Millen says "school is fun" and she likes to do projects. She especially enjoyed making brass rubbings at the National Cathedral.

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## PROGRAMS FOR SENIOR ADULTS

Did you know about the County's fabulous program for senior adults? There are clubs, trips, workshops, lectures, music programs, dancing, films and a lot more.

The key to all this activity is a copy of the Senior Adult Newsletter, sent out monthly by the County just for senior adults. The newsletter lists activities for the month and upcoming trips you can sign up for. It has lots of chatty news about the many seniors clubs around the County. Senior adults can get on the mailing list for the newsletter by callin'g 358-4744.

One of the more interesting clubs is the Lubber Run Walking Club, which sponsors walking tours of various places on Wednesdays. Last month they visited Georgetown \& Montrose Park, the George Washington Parkway Trail, the University of Maryland Campus, and a Monastery.

There were 19 trips scheduled for seniors in January, and 18 more for February. Each local area trip normally has a bus fee of $\$ 4$ or $\$ 5$, plus about $\$ 10$ if the trip includes lunch, but low income seniors pay less. There are some longer trips too--including one this month to a Victorian Restaurant and Theatre in King of Prussia, Pa. (\$36) and a big one to Disneyworld for a week at $\$ 765$. You have to sign up for most trips in advance.

Other programs include classes on knitting, dancing, literature, oil painting, sewing, crocheting, sign language, bridge, crafts, Sparish, yoga, cooking, woodcarving, quilting, writing, and stone carving. You can play billiards, ping pong, dominoes, bingo, golf, chess and checkers. You can hear lectures about cholesterol, Altzheimers, travel spots, meditation, Medicare claims, and Elderhostling. There is more, but we're out of space.
