## APRIL MEETING: LEGISLATIVE UPDATE BY SENATOR HOLLAND AND DELEGATE STAMBAUGH

Our April 6th BSCL meeting will feature a visit by our two State legislators, Delegate Warren G. Stambaugh and Senator Edward M. Holland. They will update us on the new laws passed or rejected by the Virginia General Assembly in the session which just ended. Our meeting will take place the day after their final Assembly wrap up session, so you will be hearing up-to-the-minute news.

Among the major issues Senator Holland and Delegate Stambaugh will address will be the new authority for counties to charge income tax to pay for transportation projects (not likely to be used by the Arlington County Board) and new laws on vehicular homicide. Plus anything you want to ask about action or lack thereof on drugs, corruption, crime, the environment, you name it. (Due to the political flavor of this evening the questions will be limited to Barcroft residents to eliminate early campaigning!)

The program starts at 7:30 PM, April 6 th at the Barcroft Community House, 800 South Buchanan Street. Come and hear what your State legislators have been doing on your behalf.

DEADLINE TO APPLY FOR COUNTY TAX DEFERRAL PLAN FOR SENIORS EXTENDED TO APRIL 15

## WILL THE STATE DEPARTMENT BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR AT ARLINGTON HALL? STAY TUNED

After considerable bickering, the County and the Department of State are closer to resolving their disagreement on who will pay for site improvements around Arlington Hall. It may be you.

The County wants the Department of State to foot the bill for
"streetscaping" along George Mason Drive and Arlington Boulevard. At a meeting in the Boardroom attended by BSCL officers the County Board members explained that any developer in Arlington is expected to install wide sidewalks, underground utility wires, streetlighting that meets the County standard, as well as paying for any changes in traffic lanes or signals at entrances. State says they have no extra funds and do not want to take the money from their new buildings to use it for improvements outside the site. State also is balking at constructing the bicycle path to connect to Thomas Jefferson Community Center. (This is in part because some Alcova residents object to having the bicycles pass by their houses--separated from them by the chain link fence.)

How will this be resolved? Slowly. We Barcrofters will see the results eventually in whether or not George Mason Drive continues to be an eyesore, the lighting along Arlington Boulevard continues to be inadequate, and our tax money has to be spent to install a left turn lane or light at the entrance to the site. We also will see how far the bicycle path gets us toward TJ Center. Meantime, the West side (Barcroft side) is still planned for a nice neighborhood park, so there should be some improvement in any event. Stay tuned.

The County Tax Assessor, Mr. Tommy Rice, spoke to our March meeting on how your home is assessed. If he is correct your assessment is about $80 \%$ of the selling price of your home if you were unfortunate enough to leave Barcroft this year.

Mr. Rice's office bends over backwards to be fair about tax assessments. They visit homes every 6 years. (No Barcrofter remembered a visit by an assessor, but we asked around the next day and found some Arlingtonians did.

You can appeal your assessment if you think it is too high. The assessors may have you down for an extra bathroom or a garage you tore down last year. You can call Mr. Rice at 358-3300 and ask for the "Carat Sheet" for your house, which shows the features that make up your assessment. You can also ask about the assessments of other properties around you to see if yours seems out of line. Or you can go to the central library and ask the librarian to help you find the information in the assessment records they have there. The library also has a book called Real Estate Sales where you can see what houses have sold for on your street.

What happens if you appeal and the assessors find a new bathroom you installed last year? No increase is made in your tax bill this year, to avoid penalizing you for helping out the assessor. But next year your tax bill will be higher. If your appeal is successful your bill is lowered, and you get the benefit immediately. In most cases where a mistake is found the tax bill is lowered by somewhere between $\$ 65$ and $\$ 165$.

Our Realtor panel provided some good discussion at the meeting too. Betty Jane Myers, Pat O'Brien and Sue Sarcone covered some interesting subjects like whether you should add on to your home or move to a larger one. Lots in Barcroft are now valued at $\$ 65,000$ each or more. Home values keep going up because more people want to live in Arlington.

The Barcrofters at the meeting noted that rising assessments are one thing, but wanted to know why the tax rate can't be lowered to keep their taxes from going up. Arlington's tax rate is lower than any of the other local jurisdictions. For a home assessed at \$165,300 the homeowner paid 1988 taxes of $\$ 1,471$ in Arlington County, $\$ 2,066$ in Fairfax, and $\$ 2,149$ in Alexandria. That makes Arlington sound good. But the increase in our taxes has still been very rapid, and much higher than inflation. At the Civic Federation's March meeting a member of the Budget Committee said that taxes rose $43 \%$ in the last 4 years while inflation was only 15\%. Some Barcrofters at our meeting asked what the homeowner is getting for that increase. The group thought it would be a good idea to have a session with a County Board member to hear why tax bills keep rising. Stay tuned for the May meeting, where we will do just that.

## ANOTHER FOUR MILE RUN CLEANUP DAY ON APRIL 22

Stocking Four Mile Run with trout is not just for fishing. The program brings out citizen volunteers to help with cleanup of the stream, providing a year-round benefit for all of us. Last year 10,000 people participated in the stream cleanup days, trout fishing and educational programs. When you count up the cost of the fish and subtract the value of the volunteer cleanup, the program actually saves the County money.

If you believed that one, let us tell you about the huge rainbow trout we almost caught last week when the fishing season opened on March 18. Seriously, the County spends $\$ 6,000$ on a trout stocking, and a lot of people get recreational benefits from it. The volunteers collected $6 \frac{1}{2}$ tons of trash last year and put in 1,300 hours of volunteer time, so we taxpayers end up paying $\$ 4.62 /$ hour for cleanup labor if you are still computing the benefits.

Another cleanup day is scheduled for April 22. The Editor will be there, along with a raft of other bicyclists who ride along Four Mile Run all year and would like to see it cleaner. Barcroft volunteers should go to Glencarlyn Park from 8 to 11 AM. A free picnic lunch (a "free lunch" goes with saving taxes and the fish story) will be served there from noon to 3 PM for cleanup folks. We Barcrofters have the opportunity to clean out the original Carlin Springs (both of them). It may be worth the trip just to find out where they are. For info call 358-6427. or the Trout Hotline at 358-4400.

The more volunteer laborers turn out the less the County pays per hour. So come on out and make sure the County saves lots of your tax money!

## BARCROFT CLUB CELEBRATES 50 YEARS OF GOOD NEIGHBORS

The "K" Klub of Barcroft will celebrate its 50 th year on Sunday April 23 at a luncheon on the cruise ship Dandy down on the Potomac.

Longtime member Grace Blundell of 4 th St. S reminisces that it was over a friendly cup of coffee that the first idea for the club emerged back in 1939. Club originators Mrs. Ruth Clark on 3rd St. S. and Mrs. Gladys Frank are still active members today, and befitting the occasion they are President and VicePresident for the year of 1989.

When the $K$ Klub was first formed, the immediate neighborhood was new, being settled by young married couples eager to put down roots and start families. There was a need for women to get to know each other better. The club has served as an extended family as members have enjoyed seeing their children grow up and in turn raise their own families with many staying in this area.

The original club boundaries were Fifth, Fourth, Third and Abingdon Streets. (6th St $S$. did not exist at the time the club was formed!) The membership limit was 25 and at one time there was a waiting list to join. Meetings were held once a month in the homes of members. Dues started at 10 cents a month and have slowly increased to one dollar per month.

While primarily a social club, K Klub members have also assisted those in need. Sometimes a goodwill offering was collected to help a needy family in the neighborhood or one that was read about in the paper.

Over the course of 50 years the membership has changed drastically. Some members have moved from the area, a few have dropped out for personal reasons and, sadly, many have passed away. At present there are 11 members.

You may be wondering what the " $K$ " stands for. Grace Blundell explains that the founders were rather lively
young folks and the "K" stands for "keen". (Does that mean that a club formed now might be called the "A" Club--for "awesome"?)

Congratulations to the K Klub members and their husbands as they celebrate a lifetime of friendship and neighborliness.
