MAY MEETING: BOARD MEMBER AL EISENBERG WILL DISCUSS THE COUNTY BUDGET AND TAX RATE. AND WE WILL ELECT OFFICERS

You got your tax bill this month, and it was higher. The rise comes from rising assessed values, even though the Board lowered our tax rate again this year. The rate is the lowest in the area. For a typical Barcroft home value the homeowner paid 1988 taxes of \$1,471 in Arlington County, \$2,066 in Fairfax, and \$2,149 in Alexandria. But your taxes still went up, and you may ask "What is the homeowner getting for the higher tax?"

County Board Member Al Eisenberg has gladly agreed to come to our May meeting to answer that question and more. He wants to explain the County budget and give you a chance to put yourself in the Board's shoes and tell him who you would cut--drug law enforcement, affordable housing, making the Barcroft School building a decent place to learn, street maintenance, sidewalks, snow removal, the library, fire protection, etc. Mr. Eisenberg is an articulate and interesting speaker who enjoys talking to community groups and never ducks a tough question. This will be a good discussion.

Our other featured event will be elections for officers for the 1989-90 year. Please call Nominating Committee members Anne Noll at 892-6710 or Pat Roach at 920-8131 to make a nomination or run for office.

This is our last regular meeting until September. The meeting will start at 7:30 PM at the Barcroft Community House, 800 S. Buchanan Street.

STATE DEPARTMENT VOWS TO BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR AT ARLINGTON HALL

After our article last month State Department officials told us they are indeed concerned about being a good neighbor on the Arlington Hall site, and noted numerous things they have done to meet the County's requirements for new development site plans.

We agreed that State deserves credit for making the Barcroft side of the site a park, cooperating with the County on placing sewer lines, and agreeing to the bicycle trail through their site. We just want to see their final response on streetscaping along George Mason Drive to eliminate the eyesore there now, street improvements at their George Mason entrance, lighting for the Arlington Boulevard side of the site, and the best routing of the bicycle trail, now in doubt. These very visible pieces of the plan to be resolved. They are pieces Barcroft will see and roads or trails we will use every day. For that part our neighborhood is still keeping an eye on the Department. We hope those issues can be resolved soon.

BE CAREFUL ON THE NEW WILSON BOULEVARD

Wilson Boulevard is now one-way from Rosslyn to Clarendon. The other way (eastbound toward Rosslyn) you will use Clarendon Boulevard, that big empty street that parallels Wilson. It passes between Sears and the Sears parking lot. The traffic patterns are new from Clarendon to the Courthouse, so drivers should be careful.


IS THERE A CARPENTER IN THE HOUSE?

Now it pains us to see anyone excluded from the lively, interesting and informative monthly programs of the BSCL. How keen must be the disappointment! Seriously, in the past two weeks we have heard from two wheelchair people that they would be interested in coming if it were not for our steps. That will never do for a neighborhood organization.

Is there a carpenter in the house who can construct a ramp? It would have to be easily put down and taken up, since the steps and door are too narrow to leave it down all the time. It would also have to be sturdy. We would have to figure out a place to store it, too.

BARCROFT LOVES ITS DOGS

Spring brings out the dog lover in all of us, and with daylight time the dogwalkers are no longer in the dark. In her column Kathy Kerr thanks them for cleaning up after their pets.

Spring is also a wonderful time for strolling through the new green grass barefoot, until a squish between your toes tells you that somebody was walking a dog in your yard.

This month a Barcrofter submitted an anonymous article from 6th Street about their new flower beds that had been dug up by somebody's pooch. They were angry that at least some dog owners on their block are not more responsible. Another Barcrofter recently resorted to sprinkling pepper around to discourage a dog who has chosen her lawn as its regular spot. "I have cleaned up poop there five times this week and I just don't understand why the dog's owner lets it do that. Walking the dog really means taking the dog around the block to poop on somebody else's lawn."

Lime would be easier on the dog and better for the grass than pepper, but she has a point. Another Barcrofter reported seeing a dogwalker on the school grounds with no visible means of scooping the poop permitting her dog to sully the playground where the kids would be playing the next day.

We have not heard from the dogwalkers yet, but want to present their point of view too. Dogs need exercise, and some of them are certainly very careful that their pet leaves nothing behind. Dog walkers without some visible means of cleaning up after their dog are often glared at in our neighborhood, while responsible ones with a pooper-scooper get a friendly wave. Rather than glaring at each other like strangers we might look for some way to open a comfortable conversation between the dogwalkers and the barefoot homeowners. Who has good ideas on this subject?


