## February 1 Meeting <br> DRAFT NEIGHBORHOOD CONSERVATION PLAN: TIME FOR THE FIRST BIG MEETING

By now you have surely begun plowing through your copy of the draft of the Barcroft Neighborhood Conservation Plan, which came to you in two parts about a month ago. If you live in Barcroft you should read at least the summary to see what is recommended. On February 1st we will have our first meeting to discuss the draft. Every Barcrofter who wants to speak will be heard, either in one huge group or by breaking down into discussion groups. If you prefer not to speak you can also send a letter, or mark up your copy of the draft. You can sign it or be anonymous if you want to. Mail it or drop it through Randy Swart's door at 4649 Second St. South, Arlington 22204.

Some neighborhoods have taken many meetings to revise their plans. We have fewer divisive issues than most, so we could get it in shape over two or three months. We expect the meetings will be lively and hope nobody gets too mad. Comments we have received so far indicate that most people seem to be pleased with the general approach, but there will be some debate over finishing our missing sidewalks, discouraging the breaking up of lots for infill development, and perhaps some other issues. And there will no doubt be many places where the draft can be improved. Come and see.

The meeting will start at 7:30 PM at our Barcroft Community House, 800 South Buchanan Street. We always try to end by 9 , but this time we're not making promises! Call the Neighborline at 521-1116 for an update if it snows.

## LAND USE AND ZONING ISSUES: BARCROFT SHOPPING CENTER

The El Salvador Restaurant in the Barcroft shopping center at Columbia Pike and South Buchanan Street has withdrawn its application for a live entertainment permit. The restaurant has not yet received its use permit, required by the County for it to operate, so the live entertainment request was premature.

A usually reliable source reports that the shopping center is for sale for $\$ 3.8$ million. The same source reports that the carpet store now having its "Lost Our Lease" sale there will be replaced with one of the new Blockbusters video rental stores.

Carpet stores are not convenience businesses, but at least they generate very little traffic. A major video store in that shopping center would be convenient to Barcroft users, but it would clog up the parking lot and the intersection. It might shift some neighborhood traffic from Buchanan over to Wakefield to avoid the intersection. If you have strong views on these issues, come to a BSCL meeting or call Laurie Kelsch, Chair of the Land Use and Zoning Committee, at 920-9429.

## UPDATE ON THE PIKE

A Columbia Pike Revitalization Organization subcommittee has recommended that the CPRO Board endorse the County's draft "Columbia Pike 2000 Revitalization Plan." The "2000 Plan" was drafted by County staff in June 1988 to recommend steps to revitalize Columbia Pike with an attractive "main street" environment that better balances the Pike's role as a residential and shopping center with its role as a major traffic artery.

The 221 page draft County report focuses on the Special Revitalization District (from S. Oakland Street to $S$. Courthouse Road), but it also includes discussion of Columbia Pike west to the Fairfax County line. Columbia Pike from George Mason Drive to Four Mile Run serves as the southern boundary of our Barcroft community.

The CPRO subcommittee applauded the work of the County staff in preparing the draft report, but said that more work was needed to detail some of its general concepts. The site plan review zoning proposed by the County to manage future growth on the Pike was one area where more detail was needed. The subcommittee also said the county needs to develop a detailed plan for managing auto and pedestrian traffic and parking on the Pike. The subcommittee endorsed the idea of an Interdepartmental Task Force to coordinate various County projects on the Pike.

## NEW NEIGHBORS ACTIVE ON SOCIAL ISSUES

Welcome to new neighbors Michael Stoil and Callie Gass who moved to Barcroft last fall. Formerly from Florida and Philadelphia respcectively, Michael and Callie have lived in Northern Virginia and Arlington for many years. Former residents of South Arlington, they moved to a new home in North Arlington about 4 years ago. But when they found an affordable house twice the size here in Barcroft on 6th St. S. they couldn't pass it up. Michael also admits that he prefers South Arlington anyway. He says the people are less yuppyish and "funkier".

Married for 12 years, Michael and Callie have two children--Rebecca in 4 th grade at Drew Model School and Jacob, age 4. In light of the recent episodes of children being molested on the way to school, Michael serves as monitor at the Drew bus stop in the mornings. Actually it is convenient for him to do this because he has to wait for his Metro bus to take him to work. (Michael is a long time user of public transportation and just got a driver's license for the first time in many years in July, 1989.)

Michael has two jobs, one as the Washington editor for "Alcoholism and Addiction Magazine." He is also the Director of Information and Referral for the Metro area Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse. Basically he is the person people call when they respond to $T V$ and radio public service announcements offering information and referrals for help with substance abuse. Having worked previously for a long time as a consultant, Michael says he enjoys actually "doing" instead of "advising."

As a result of his drug and alcohol expertise, Michael can be seen or heard on radio and TV about four times per month. In December he was on the TV show "State of Siege" (channel 5) talking about amphetamine abuse. He did some radio and TV shows regarding topics such as prescription and holiday drug abuse.


Callie works for the Northern Virginia Planning District Commission as a specialist on childcare and housing. She does research and publishes in the area of childcare. A recent and often reprinted paper was about why childcare workers don't stay in the profession. Suprisingly, low salary was not the reason rather lack of respect and parent neglect of children (ie. parents dropping off sick, hungry or dirty kids) cause workers to quit.

Callie was once extremely active in the local Democratic party but her new job precludes this involvement since she now works for the state government. Presently Callie is active with the Arlington/Fairfax Jewish Congregation where she presently serves as the Vice-President for Youth and Education.
