PROGRESS ON THE NEIGHBORHOOD CONSERVATION PLAN: MARCH 1 MEETING WILL REVIEW AND REVISE THE DRAFT

Our February 1 meeting drew about 50 Barcrofters to comment on the draft of the Neighborhood Conservation Plan. It was a rousing success, and everyone present had an opportunity to speak. The range of ideas was considerable, and we have compiled the comments, along with others dropped through Randy Swart's door or telephoned to him, in a 22 page listing. Call Randy for a copy at 521-2080 if you would like to see all of the comments.

Our Focus Committee met twice to respond to the comments with draft revisions to propose to the March 1 meeting. Changes will be proposed throughout the document, but the major areas of concern were:

- 1. Traffic. Barcrofters do not want speeding cars in their neighborhood, particularly cut-through traffic between Arlington Boulevard and Columbia Pike. We do not want to inconvenience ourselves with speed bumps or nubs, but we need to find ways to cut down the speeding, and perhaps the number of cut-throughs. This affects the recommendations on Arlington Boulevard access, Columbia Pike & Buchanan, and stop signs or other measures on Buchanan and Wakefield. The Focus Committee has worked on this issue and will have recommendations on the requested revisions for the March 1 meeting.
- 2. Metro. Barcrofters do not want the intense development which would accompany a metro line on Columbia Pike. The Focus Committee will

recommend that the Plan emphasize instead the need for good metro bus connections with metro rail stations.

- 3. Access to Four Mile Run. There is disagreement on where access to Four Mile Run should be improved. Some favor 7th Street, some favor 8th Street and some oppose either or both. The Focus Committee may present alternatives for the meeting to consider.
- 4. Neighborhood Park on Arlington Hall Property. There are several suggestions for review of plans we have put forth for the park on the west side of George Mason Drive. The plan prepared by Barcroft architect Linda Titolo was intended as a conceptual drawing, rather than a finished design. The Focus Committee will probably recommend some changes in the location of gates for pedestrians and vehicles.
- 5. <u>Sidewalks</u>. Barcroft School PTA and many parents support stronger language on adding sidewalks on at least one side of the streets where children walk to school. On 7th & 8th Streets they support parking between Wakefield and Buchanan on only one side of the street unless sidewalks are installed, since the street is very narrow and children now must walk in the one center lane.
- 6. <u>Dogs</u>. A new paragraph will address chronic barking and cleaning up messes.
- If these issues concern you, come to the meeting at the Barcroft Community House, 800 S. Buchanan, at 7:30 PM on March 1, or let Randy Swart know.

SAFE HOUSE PROGRAM FOR BARCROFT?

BSCL Vice President Laurie Kelsch has been working on organizing a Safe House program to provide Barcroft children a place to find help if needed on the way to or from school. Arlington County has rejected the McGruff Safe House Program as "not cost effective" due to personnel constraints and the extensive police checks necessary to certify each safe house. There will be a meeting of Barcrofters interested in a Safe House program on Tuesday, March 13 at 7:30 PM at the Barcroft Community House, 800 S. Buchanan Street.


ZONING AND LAND USE ISSUES

ON THE PIKE



The County Recreation Department will stock Four Mile Run with trout again this year from Bluemont Park down to Shirlington Road. Fishing for them starts at 9 AM on March 17. (You could fish in the morning and go to the Barcroft School Carnival for more fun afterwards.) There will be a stream cleanup day the week before on Saturday March 10. The volunteer labor on cleanup day saves the County enough to justify the cost of stocking the stream with fish, so if you enjoy the fishing you should think about pitching in on cleanup day. The Arlington County Parks and Recreation Department called recently to check on Barcroft's reaction to a proposal to place a miniature golf course down Four Mile Run in Barcroft Park, which is just past George Mason Drive and before the tennis courts. We noted that members had not been polled on the subject but we did not expect a negative reaction. The new course would replace the Putt Putt golf course, an Arlington institution, which was closed last year to be converted to a new Ballston building.

UPDATE ON BARCROFT SCHOOL'S RENOVATION/ADDITION

The Barcroft School Building Planning Committee consisting of staff, PTA representatives and community members met for the third time in January. committee has been working with Arlington School's Facilities Planner, Jim Wilson, to develop educational specifications for Barcroft.

At this point the architectural firm, Helbing Lipp, Ltd., is in the process of drawing up preliminary plans to be submitted to the school board and the state for approval. This is the final step that can be taken before the scheduled School Bond Referendum in November 1990. Funding to finance the proposed addition to Barcroft will come from this school bond.

ORANGE TELEPHONE NUMBER STICKERS ON YOUR TELEPHONE MAY BE OUT OF DATE!

When your Neighborhood Watch program was established the Police gave out orange stickers with 911 and their non-emergency number to place on your telephone. The 911 number is still the same, of course, but the non-emergency police and fire numbers were changed about two years ago. If your sticker shows two separate numbers for fire and police, it is out of date. Change it to show only 558-2222 for either police or fire. Or pick up a new one at the next Barcroft School and Civic League meeting. The 911 emergency number for police or fire has not changed.

A NEW NEIGHBOR FROM AN ACTIVE ARLINGTON FAMILY

Barcroft has another interesting new neighbor. Welcome to Scott Allard of 4th St. S. who moved in January, 1990. A life-long resident of Arlington, (pretty much) Scott had been living on Columbia Pike. He was tired of renting and happy to find a home in Barcroft.

With a background in economics and electrical engineering, Scott works for a small consulting firm that takes on defense contracts up at Skyline.

Scott comes from a very, very long line of civic activists. How long a line you may wonder? Well, his great-greatgreat-great grandfather was Francis Scott Key. (Even Scott's first name is family history!) Scott reports that Francis Scott Key used to live down in Georgetown at the Key Bridge terminus. As the roads expanded, his house was dismantled and stored in the footings of the bridge in hopes of rebuilding it elsewhere. Unfortunately, it was not well protected. As homes in Georgetown deteriorated people scavenged for authentic bricks and beams to repair their property. The remains of the Key home are throughout Georgetown!

Scott's father was president of the Arlington Historical Society while his mother was always active with groups such as United Way. Several years ago Scott's brother lived in the oldest house in Arlington, known as the Balls-Sellers House in Glencarlyn. His brother paid very low rent to live in the newer part of the house but he also had to tolerate frequent visitors, spartan surroundings and a lot of upkeep! That house was once owned by Frank Ball of Ballston fame. It was later owned by a woman named Sellers who deeded the house to the Historical Society. Scott himself hopes to pursue his interests in historical appreciation and community activities.

He s off to a good start. Scott has already attended a BSCL meeting and says he was very impressed. He came to the February meeting, which indeed was


probably our best meeting ever. The large crowd was divided into 5 or 6 small groups who then discussed the Neighborhood Conservation plan. All comments were recorded. The large crowd reconvened and each group gave a report of the comments. Scott was impressed by the commonality of the comments. It was remarkable how often some issues were mentioned and how much general agreement there was. The areas of diverging opinions were also interesting but seemed to be relatively few.

Scott also happened to move in next door to one of Arlington's greatest movers and shakers--civic activist Ann Noll, our very best recruiter. Good luck Scott!
