MAY 1ST SPECIAL ELECTION FOR COUNTY BOARD -- GET READY TO VOTE!

On May 1st (that's Mayday, folks, and it is not in November, it's next week) the County is holding a special election to fill the County Board vacancy left by John Milliken's departure to be Virginia State Secretary of Transportation.

Our Candidates Night on April 5 was very well attended, and we had a chance to meet the candidates face to face. They are Republican Monte Davis and Democrat Jim Hunter. You have all received their mailings highlighting their qualifications.

Voter turnout will be light for this special election--probably as low as 20%. That means that your vote counts 5 times. The margin of victory may be as few as 200. Barcroft could decide the winner. If we want our neighborhood to be listened to it is important that political candidates know that we vote. Please come out to the school on May 1 and vote--for your neighborhood.

The polls will be open on May 1st from 6 AM to 7 PM. There will be no crowds, no lines and no waiting. Come early for the delicious goodies at the Barcroft PTA bake sale just outside the polling area. Mark your calendar, since there will be no national news coverage to remind you that it is election day. May 1st, the first Tuesday in May. See you at the polls!


TEENS' SUMMER WORK PROGRAM

BEING A CONSIDERATE NEIGHBOR MEANS CONTROLLING YOUR PETS

Many Barcrofters have voiced concern about Animal Control: what are the responsibilities of pet owners, and what can be done about the occasional neighbor who refuses to comply with County ordinances?

DOGS

Constant Barking

The County Noise Ordinance makes this a police matter. Often the problem is a dog left alone during the day barking for attention. If the barking is during the day, two unrelated households must swear out a complaint against the dog. After the complaints are filed, the police will call the Animal Welfare League, who will issue a warning to the owner. If the barking continues, the owner will be fined \$40 each time a complaint is filed. Three tickets require a court appearance. If the barking is at night, call the police. If the owner can not be found, the dog can be removed from the property.

Leashing your dog and excretion removal Dog owners are required by law to leash their dog or lead and control it when outside their own property. Owners are also responsible for removing the dog's excretion from anyone else's property and public streets. If an owner fails to do this, especially on a frequent basis, you can call the Animal Welfare League. An animal warden will deliver the owner a warning for a first offense and speak to them about the ordinances and penalties. The Animal Welfare League will patrol the area and issue a ticket if the owner does not comply. The third ticket requires a court appearance with fines as high as \$300 and a possible jail term.

Animal Bites

There are three classes of dog bites:

1) Vicious - It is unlawful to keep a dog known to be vicious or which attacks human beings or destroys property. Vicious means a physical threat to human beings or other animals. Vicious dogs will be put to sleep. 2) Accidents - If playing with a dog overexcites it and it bites, it is classified as an accident and the dog is given a second chance. 3) Harassment - Both adults and children may harass and provoke a dog to bite by teasing or by crossing over an owner's property.

by crossing over an owner's property. The dog is given a second chance. Repeat offenses result in the dog being removed from Arlington County. All biters are quarantined. If rabies vaccination is not verified, the dog receives a shot.

CATS

There are two laws in Arlington on cats. Cats must be vaccinated against rabies, and cats are not allowed to be on any one else's property. If a cat is captured on someone else's property, the Animal Welfare League will come and pick it up. The owner pays a \$10 daily boarding fee, and if the cat needs a rabies shot it will cost another \$18.

If you need help with any of these situations call the Animal Welfare League at 931-9241. They handle a variety of problems, including wild animals and animal adoptions. If they can't do it, they are helpful in putting you in touch with someone who can.

AROUND THE NEIGHBORHOOD with Kathy Kerr

COOKING CLASSES ARE FOR GOOD FUN AND GOOD EATING

Do you like to eat? Have you ever gone out for dinner and wondered just how the chef made that food taste so good? Do you like to cook--whether you are good at it or not? If so, consider taking a cooking class through Arlington County Adult Education, then invite some friends over for dinner and amaze them.

There are just two rules to consider before attending your first class:

- 1. Do not eat before you go!
- 2. Take a container to bring home some leftovers if you are lucky!

I have two teachers in particular to recommend. First, if you are into Vietnamese food, or would like to be into Vietnamese food, you are guaranteed to enjoy the classes taught by Ms. Dong. She is a nutritionist by profession and came to this country from Vietnam in 1975. Taking a class or two of hers has made me feel VERY comfortable buying some of the "unusual" products sold at the local oriental groceries. Vietnamese food is healthy, nutritious and usually not terribly spicy.

Professionally trained chef Paul Chretien offers classes in a wide variety of cuisines and believe me you will be preparing some of the finest food you ever tasted! This spring he is offering "Vegetable Cookery 1" (and he would add that it is NOT vegetarian cooking.) If vegetables sound boring to you, I'm sure they will no longer be if you take this class. In April he gave "Italian Appetizers". If I wasn't having a baby about then I'd have been enrolled! He had his students prepare at least 25 appetizers and you will find better in few, if any, area restaurants.

In the future, watch for more of Chef Paul's classes including Cajun/Creole, Northern Italian cuisine, Chinese cookery, Fish preparation and anything else he offers. They are all great!

Both of these classes are like dinner parties except the "guests" get to make the food. I really enjoyed working with foods I would normally never learn about, with people I had never met before. These teachers generally hold classes at Wakefield High School from 7-10pm one night a week for 3 to 5 weeks. Class prices vary and may seem high to you but these teachers come to class ready (for you) to cook with the finest ingredients.

For more information call Adult Ed. at 358-6900. (Their other classes are probably terrific too!) Bon Appetit!


GYPSY MOTH TIME


