Funds Approved for Park Renovation

In March the County Board approved \$12,000 in Neighborhood Conservation funds to finish the renovation of the park at Columbia Pike and Four Mile Run. The project will include grading, removing the concrete pad where the recycling bins are now located, adding a split-rail fence along Columbia Pike, and replanting the area in grass. The transformation will be completed by a landscaping project of the Women's Club of Arlington. The park will look like somebody cares, and we hope it will improve the tone of that section of Columbia Pike.

Arlington County has designed the new recycling site across the Pike from the present one; the move will permit better and safer access to the bins. Now they need detailed engineering designs, a land use permit from the Northern Virginia Regional Parks Authority, approval from the Planning Commission, approval by the County Board, and a contractor. The process is slow, and we cannot finish our park renovation until the bins are moved. Keep your eye on that spot, though. Things will happen there.

MAY MEETING

The BSCL's Annual Meeting includes the election of new officers. This year we will also vote on the new Bylaws and Articles of Incorporation. There must be a quorum—at least 42 members—to approve the new documents. If there is not a quorum, we will have to live with such embarrassments as the language limiting membership to members of the caucasian race (voided by the Supreme Court and by the BSCL, but never corrected in the Bylaws). Come and help us bring these essential documents up to date. Pat Roach has done a great deal of pro bono legal work on the two documents and deserves support.

The Bylaws were read in their entirety at the April meeting, and copies are available from Randy Swart (521-2080). The Articles of Incorporation were inserted in the April *Barcroft News*. This meeting should, therefore, be reasonably short. As an added inducement, Joyce Hutchins has promised her special brownies for refreshments afterward.

Final Tally: Computers for Classrooms



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Barcroft School Remodeling Report

Although you do not see any activity on the Barcroft Elementary School remodeling project, rest assured that the staff responsible for managing Arlington Schools facilities have been hard at work. Final plans are being submitted to the Commonwealth of Virginia for approval so that construction can begin immediately after the school year ends in June.

During the first construction period, the seven classes now in the primary wing will be moved to portable classrooms set up in front of the building. The unit will be a small enclosed building with covered hallways, an established entrance, and bathrooms. County officials are being consulted in the careful planning of this temporary structure.

The kindergatten program currently located in the primary wing will be moved to a

room off the library, keeping it in the main building.

For more information about the remodeling and construction plans, come to the June BSCL meeting. Dr. Kahan and other staff members will be the invited speakers.

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Arlington's Best Kept Secrets

Where Was the Old Barcroft Mill?

In the 1830s, George Washington Parke Custis (known as "Washington" Custis), owner of Arlington estate and Arlington House, built a mill in what is now Barcroft neighborhood. He called it the Arlington Mill. There was more water in Four Mile Run at that time, and they were able to bring grain up to the mill by boat.

During the "War of Northern Aggression," the mill was destroyed by Yankees. Afterwards it languished—until the 1880s, when Dr. John Wolverton Barcroft returned to this area, rebuilt the mill, and named it the Barcroft Mill. He owned it until 1924, when he sold it to Robert Taylor. In 1926 the mill burned, set afire by hot cinders from a steam train passing on the W&OD Railroad. (That same year the BSCL decided to replace the roof on the Community House with asphalt safety shingles.) Later an icehouse was built on the old mill's foundation, then

But where exactly was the mill? Our resourceful detective sought out Adaline Marye Robertson, a Barcrofter who remembers it. With some help from Earl Barbee, supervisor of the southern district of Arlington's parks, they pinpointed the location as the site now occupied by two car repair shops behind the new 7-11 across Columbia Pike from Safeway, now 4961 and 4969 10th St. South. Columbia Pike actually jogged a bit south of the current bridge, traversing what is now 10th St. You can see where it crossed Four Mile Run






and rejoined the current Pike at the east end of the present bridge.

The mill stood between the old and new roads. If you search out its historical marker, you will find it across Four Mile Run from the actual mill site.

[Earl remembered his father buying ice at the icehouse. With the advent of refrigerators and cars, people no longer needed ice (but did need car repairs). No more icehouse.]

Our explorer's next task is to figure out where the old dam was that diverted water into the mill race. Adaline Robertson thinks it was about at Huffman's Whitewater. More on that in another column.



BARCROFT'S BEST KEPT SECRETS: Where Are the Sears Houses?

In the early part of this century, you could buy a house from Sears, Roebuck. It came in kit form, with all the boards, nails, shingles, doors, windows, and everything else needed to build a house. Each part was numbered and marked "Sears." Most owners hired a builder to put the house up, since John Hechinger had not yet discovered the do-it-yourself bonanza. The homes were good quality and the prices were reasonable.

There is at least one known Sears house in Barcroft, and another one looks like a Sears house. The known one is the Rightmyers' place at 812 S. Taylor, a beautiful home. There is a second home that strongly resembles one of Sears' models on 8th St. Only a check of the boards and beams to look for the Sears markings will tell the tale.

There are several prefabricated houses in Barcroft. The most interesting of them is Lily Mary David's Lustron home on 3rd St. The exterior walls are made of metal panels with a baked-on factory finish.


Northern Virginia Folk Festival '91


