

### JANUARY MEETING: Columbia Pike Revitalization Organization

## How Should County Facilities Be Located?

In November the BSCL formed a committee to respond to the initiative by the South Arlington Coalition of Civic Associations asking for a Countywide effort to develop guidelines for the placement of unwanted County facilities. These guidelines would be formulated by a "collaborative decision-making process" coordinated by a paid facilitator and including County staff and as many different County civic groups as possible.


# **Holiday Luncheon**




# Retaining Wall on Columbia Pike

Our Neighborhood Conservation Plan calls for the construction of a retaining wall along the sidewalk on Columbia Pike from Taylor St. east to the shopping center. Mud now washes down on the sidewalk with every rain, which is particularly bothersome to seniors walking from Wakefield Towers to the shopping center.

The Plan envisioned County funding for the wall, which we had been assured was included in the upcoming capital improvements. That funding will not be there with the current tight budget unless we push the project, perhaps with Neighborhood Conservation bond funds. Congratulations to Jonathan DeMik on receiving his Eagle Scout award on Nov.17. All Eagle Scouts are required to complete a special project. Jonathan chose a project that would benefit our neighborhood. He worked closely with Greg Zell, a naturalist at Long Branch Nature Center whose goal is to nurture wildlife in our area and provide limited access for people to observe it. Greg suggested that Jonathan rebuild the dock at Sparrow Swamp as a platform for observers. Jonathan worked hard removing the old dock and building the sturdy and attractive new one, and Barcroft thanks you. Jonathan is the son of Liz and Tom DeMik, who live on 9th St.

#### The Great Beaver Mystery

An article in the November issue of the *Barcroft News* reported that the Barcroft beaver may have disappeared from Sparrow Swamp. Some readers may have gotten the erroneous impression that the beaver left because of the new dock. I asked Greg Zell about that, and he seriously doubts that the construction had anything to do with it.

According to Greg, beaver tolerate the presence of humans; there are even some living behind a highrise on Fairfax Drive! He suggested that the beaver may have simply moved on—possibly because of poor food quality—or died or become ill. There are actually more beaver in Arlington than the habitat can support, so there may have been a territorial dispute with other nearby beaver. Greg views the beaver's departure as a natural event and fully expects others to move into Sparrow Swamp within the next year.

Since beaver are the most active at night and often best observed very early after dawn, it is hard to know for sure whether the beaver are there and how many there are. Greg says as many as two adults and two kits have been sighted at the swamp. Naturalists can watch for signs of increased dam building and feeding to indicate that beaver have returned. In the meantime, we can try to spot the muskrat that has moved in under the new dock.

They can be seen sunning themselves on the logs. Although It may appear to some that the wildlife has diminished, Four Mile Run actually supports a dynamic wildlife population. Greg has successfully planted a breeding population of turtles in the swamp. Migrating birds regularly pass through here, and birds that are here for much of the year go elsewhere for the winter. Members of the Virginia Society of Ornithologists have even seen great blue herons.

The wonderful violinist who played in the Barcroft Christmas Band, and treated us to a beautiful solo, was Jeanne Roningen. Jeanne is a junior at H-B Woodlawn, Arlington's alternative middle/high school. Jeanne is currently a member of the Northern Virginia Youth Symphony, which toured Scotland last summer. She also plays in a quartet that is available for weddings and parties!

Jeanne's mother, Jane, is a private tutor and sings in the church choir. Her father is an economist with the USDA who enjoys listening to




