

FEBRUARY MEETING: Hispanic Counseling Center

The Barcroft School and Civic League will meet on Thursday, February 6, at 7:30 PM. Sister Hobelman, executive director of Hogar Hispano, will speak to us about her organization, a Hispanic counseling center on S. 9th Street, next to the Vietnamese Catholic Church. It is supported by both the Catholic Diocese of Arlington and the United Way. Sister Hobelman will discuss the types of services offered to residents of Barcroft.

CPRO: A Chance to Improve Barcroft

Valencia Cherry, the new director of the Columbia Pike Revitalization Organization (CPRO), presented an interesting challenge to Barcroft residents at the January BSCL meeting. She pointed out that improvements can occur on the Barcroft end of the Pike only if there is active representation of our interests on the CPRO committees. Because CPRO is reorganizing and will have fewer Board members, it is not clear whether there will be a Barcroft representative on the future Board. This makes active CPRO committee membership even more important if Barcroft interests are to be addressed.

One committee of particular relevance is Planning and Urban Design, which has a very able Barcroft representative, Anne Noll. Another, which will form in the spring, is the Community Development Committee.

As Ms. Cherry noted, CPRO has spent most of its first five years directing resources for improvements to the east end of the Pike, in the Special Revitalization District. It is now time to plan the improvements to be made from George Mason Dr. to the County line.

This means Barcroft citizens should pull together their ideas for improvements and begin working with CPRO and the County to see that they are realized. Scott Allard (BSCL vice president), I (Annette Osso), and others at the meeting suggested that a place to start may be the George Mason intersection, which is already experiencing some private development. Larry Goldschmidt, BSCL president, suggested that interested Barcrofters form a small committee to brainstorm their ideas and

present them to CPRO. (If you are interested, please call Scott Allard at 521-0825.)

In addition, CPRO has other committees of potential interest. They are the Marketing (meets the third Wednesday of the month), Special Events, Merchants, and Fundraising Committees. The meeting time of the Planning and Urban Design Committee is the first Wednesday of each month. For additional information on CPRO Committee activities and to join a committee, call Valencia Cherry at 892-2776.

Look for the Gypsies

Gypsy moths are all around us, waiting for spring to come out and eat our trees. You will find them in the form of egg masses, which look like little tan furry lumps about the size of the first joint of your little finger.

The eggs will hatch in a couple of months. Thousands of gypsy moth caterpillars will emerge from each egg mass and head for the leaves of your nicest trees. Now is the time to find and destroy the eggs—before they can hatch. Look for the egg masses on woodpiles, doorways, window frames, tree branches—almost any sheltered place. Scrape them carefully into a cup of Clorox or some alcohol. Stomping them on the ground does not kill the eggs. An alternative is to seal them in a plastic bag and put them in your eagle cart, where they will end up in the incinerator. The important thing is to conduct your moth hunt now, while it's cold outside. When the spring weather comes it will be too late, and the caterpillars will be eating your trees. Help make chemical sprays unnecessary hunt down your gypsy moths this week!

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Let It Snow

Our first dusting of snow caused tremendous traffic problems all over the greater metropolitan area. Who would have thought such a small amount could wreak such havoc? It served as a good reminder of just how poorly people in our area deal with snow and ice.

Drivers, please remember: If you don't like driving in the snow, don't do it! Take the bus or the subway; you'll probably get where you're going a lot sooner anyway. If you do drive, just relax and take your time. Everyone on the road wants or needs to get someplace just as much as you do, so be cautious and courteous. Keep to the right if you can't go the speed limit; there may be other people on the



road with better adverse-weather driving skills who want to get around you safely. Most important, don't abandon your car in the middle of the road if the going gets too tough! This only impedes traffic more, prevents snowplows from doing their job, and prolongs the period of messy roads.

Homeowners, please do your part: If there is a sidewalk along the street in front of your house, shovel it! It's your responsibility. Don't force pedestrians into the streets; clear a path to the pavement at least a shovel's width within 24 hours after the snow stops. It's also a lot easier to shovel **before** a lot of pedestrian traffic has packed the snow down.

Remember the pothole that ate your car last year? After the snow has melted and some degree of normalcy has returned, be sure to report dangerous potholes to the Public Works folks. You can call the Patchline (Arlington roads, 358-6458; state roads, 359-1220; federal roads, 285-2109) and provide the location of the pothole, giving the exact street address or precise intersection. Public Works will repair potholes within 48 hours when streets are dry.

If we all cooperate, we can enjoy the beauty of a winter snowstorm comfortably and safely.

Application for Virginia Landmarks Register Stalled

The Barcroft Community House has been designated by Arlington County as a Historic District. (You can see the bronze plaque on the corner of the newly painted building.) Our Neighborhood Conservation Plan mentioned that the neighborhood needed assistance in applying to the State of Virginia for state historic status as well.

In January Ms. Gail H. Baker, long-time member of Arlington's Historic Affairs and Landmark Review Board, took on the task of preparing our application for historic status. We were able to help her with the considerable amount of material gathered by the History Committee for the Neighborhood Conservation Plan and other materials such as the collection of the 1903 *Barcroft News* provided by some of the neighborhood's long-time residents. Gail worked hard in the Virginiana Room of the library and elsewhere to supplement these materials and prepared an application to include the Community House on the Virginia Landmarks Register.

The preliminary response from Richmond was not encouraging. The Virginia Department of Historic Resources indicated that we need more background on the role of the Community House in the community in its early days (1908–c. 1925). BSCL records and historic materials from that period apparently have been lost. We do have some recollections recorded by Mildred Handy Ritchie and others and some old photos of school classes in front of the building. But we need to unearth more to support the application for state historic status. It looks like we need to reactivate our history committee. In the meantime, the application has been shelved.

Holiday Service Luncheon

On December 19 the holiday spirit filled the Woman's Club of Arlington as the BSCL held the Second Annual Christmas Luncheon to honor the service people who make Barcroft work. In attendance were policemen, firemen, crossing guards, bus drivers, teach-

Guests were welcomed bv Gold-Larry schmidt (BSCL president), Talmadge Williams (luncheon chairman). Anne Noll (luncheon committee member) and Anne Nelson (president of the Woman's Club of Arlington, who




From all indications, our guests enjoyed themselves immensely and appreciated the acknowledgment of their contribution to the quality of life in our



The old main entrance to the school, by the Multipurpose Room, has been permanently closed. Everyone must now enter through the library entrance under the famil-





iar round window and arch. The center walk between trailers in the front of the school is the direct way to this entrance.

The school makes about 15 sandwiches every day so that no one goes hungry for lunch at Barcroft. Both peanut butter and jelly are needed, but grape jelly is especially needed. Issue Forums

Arlingtonians for a Better County (ABC) is sponsoring two Issue Forums at the Arlington Cable Television Studio, located on the second floor of the George Mason University Law School (3401 N. Fairfax Dr.).

The first—"Fiscal Affairs: Decisions Facing Arlington County"—will be held January 31, 6–7 PM. The moderator will be Barbara Favola, chair of ABC. Panelists will include Ellen Bozman, chair of the Arlington County Board; Mark Jinks, director of the Dept. of Management and Finance; Maureen Mc-Laughlin, chair of the Fiscal Affairs Advisory Committee; and Conchita Mitchell, Arlington School Board.

The second—"Homelessness in Arlington: Shelters, Services, Solutions"—will take place February 25, 8–9:30 PM. The moderator will be Barbara Favola, and the panelists will be Jim Hunter, Arlington County Board; James Hoben, president of Arlington-Alexandria Coalition for the Homeless; Ron Carlee, director of Dept. of Human Services; and Gene Betit, Parish Council.

Last month's article on rats brought forward a few more comments from other neighbors. Rats have been sighted on 4th, 3rd, and 2nd Streets as well as Pershing Drive. We have heard of one Barcrofter who was accused of harboring rats in an unkempt backvard, another who had rats in an otherwise ecologically correct compost pile, and yet another keeping their rats secret for fear people will think they are not good housekeepers. Exterminators say the main culprits in attracting rats are bird food, pet food, and firewood stacked on dirt. If you see rats, call the County at 358-6485. Sewers on Pershing Drive and 2nd Street have been baited once, but more baiting may be necessary.



BSCL Supports New Siting Procedure

The January meeting of the BSCL discussed, amended, and approved the draft letter you received in the January Barcroft News in support of a proposal by the South Arlington Coalition of Civic Associations urging the County to adopt a procedure for fairly locating new County facilities. President Larry Goldschmidt has sent the final letter to Jennie Davis, who heads up the coalition.

When other civic associations have considered the initiative, the Coalition plans to present the issue to the Arlington County Civic Federation for the next step.
