MARCH MEETING

Hogar Hispano: Hispanic Family Center

Hogar Hispano, a United Way Agency located in the old Barcroft Baptist Church at 915 S. Wakefield, offers its services to the Hispanic community and refugees from Vietnam, Cambodia, Afghanistan, Ethiopia, and other nations. Founded in 1981 by area Hispanic leaders and the Bishop of the Arlington Catholic Diocese at that time, Thomas J. Welsh, its

ultimate goal is to help immigrant and refugee clients become self-sufficient and productive members of American society.

Their services include emergency financial assistance, a food and clothing bank, a dental clinic, medical assistance and referral, a 24-hour hotline with job and housing information, translation and transportation help, income tax services, Christmas food baskets, Basic English classes, a large Christmas party and one-week summer camp for needy Hispanic children, two annual senior citizen trips, and ongoing assistance to unwed mothers.

In 1986 Hogar Hispano began to help applicants through the amnesty program. Since then, its Immigration Office has helped thousands of people with a full range of immigration services. The Migration and Refugee Services Office coordinates family reunification and refugee resettlement programs under the auspices of the U.S. Catholic Conference and a grant from the U.S. State Department.

Volunteers interested in teaching the Basic English classes or assisting with another program can call Sister Charlotte Hobelman at 970-1705, 9 AM –5 PM, weekdays. Clothing donations are also accepted during these hours.

Destroy Gypsy Moth Eggs Before They Hatch

Before you receive the next Barcroft News, any gypsy moth eggs you have not ferreted out will hatch, and the caterpillars will begin eating your trees. Then the County will have to spray stuff on the trees to preserve them. Thousands of caterpillars will emerge from that one egg mass you may have missed.

Hunt down those eggs now, while they are still in their little furry, tan, marble-sized lumps. You will find them in almost any protected spot, such as window frames, door frames, porches, firewood piles, or the underside of fence boards and tree limbs. When you find masses, drop them in Clorox, alcohol, or ammonia or burn them in your fireplace. Do not scrape the egg mass on the ground or try to crush it with your feet; the eggs are still protected as if in the mass and will hatch in the spring.

This is your last chance for 1992.



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
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Gypsy moth egg mass shown on a fingertip along with the tip of a ballpoint pen.

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

Trout Season Opens March 21



The County will again stock Four Mile Run with rainbow trout this year. The trout will be running from Barcroft Park (below George Mason Dr.) northward to Bon Air Park (above Wilson Blvd.).

On opening day, Bon Air Park above Wilson will be re-

served for children aged 15 and under. Volunteers from the Northern Virginia chapter of Trout Unlimited will be on hand at the picnic shelter and Rose Garden in Bon Air Park to instruct and help the children.

State fishing regulations will be enforced. Virginia residents aged 16–65 are required to have a Virginia fishing license; nonresidents must purchase either a nonresident fishing license or a five-day trip license. Senior citizens born after June 30, 1923 (you know who you are!) are required to purchase a \$1 annual fishing license. A state trout license is not required to fish for trout in Arlington County. Creel limit is 6 per day per person, and dip netting is not permitted.

A stream cleanup day is scheduled for March 14, before it is stocked. Individual Arlingtonians and groups such as Scouts can take part. Call 358-3403 to sign up for the cleanup day.

For a recorded message on trout events, call the County's Trout Hotline at 358-4400.

We are not accustomed to seeing that information in most publications, although almost every crime report anywhere does list the sex of the offender and other basic information needed for possible identification. One reader misinterpreted our listing such information as prejudice, and others were jarred by it.

In deference to neighborhood sensibilities, we will not be including race, sex, or ethnic origin unless the suspect escaped and

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complete description is necessary for protection against future attempts. When we do include that information, no slur against the particular race or ethnic origin is intended. African Americans, Hispanics, Jews, and Caucasians help us write and publish the *Barcroft News*. We believe our neighborhood is as free of prejudice as any in Arlington.




000 DRAMATIC
