Last year 250 participants marched, including entries from Our Savior Lutheran Church, the Woman's Club of Arlington, the Arlington Unitarian Preschool, and Miss Teenage Virginia. Leashed pets accompanied by the allimportant pooper scooper are welcome.

Curbside Recycling Comes to Barcroft

Just as this issue was going to press, we learned that curbside recycling pickup service will begin in Barcroft the week of June 15. Participation is voluntary, and you don't need to do anything unless you **do not** wish to take part. The County will deliver a bright yellow recycling bin to your door the week before service begins unless you call them at 358-6570 by Friday, May 29.

The County will collect the following items at curbside:

- Clear, brown, and green glass bottles and jars
- Metal food and beverage cans
- Plastic bottles and jugs (narrow necks)
- Newspapers and newspaper inserts

Rinse the glass, metal, and plastic items clean and remove their caps. Larger plastic jugs should be crushed to reduce volume. All of these things can be put together in the bin; they will be sorted at the processing facility. Newspapers should be tied with string or put in paper bags, just as we used to a few years ago, and placed next to the bin at the curb.



It's that simple! Many Barcrofters have already been doing all of this and then lugging the bags of stuff to the recycling bins on Columbia Pike. What a treat not to have the bags piling up on my porch, waiting for me to get the time for that trip.

We hope that Barcroft will match the participation rate of the pilot phase of the recycling program—96% elected to participate, and 85% set out their bins on a weekly basis. Maybe Barcroft can do better than this! Remember, recycling helps protect and preserve the environment. It also encourages more efficient use of our resources.





Nature Center Director Resolves Sparrow Swamp Mystery!

At the May meeting of the Barcroft School and Civic League, the Director of the Long Branch Nature Center, Greg Zell, spoke on the Center's program and the general state of affairs down in Four Mile Run valley. Greg gave us a good rundown of the County's new structure for handling parks and invited anyone to call them at 358-6535 with questions about parks, flora, and fauna. They will refer you to another number if necessary.

Naturalist Zell then provided a lot of information about the state of Four Mile Run. Yes, beaver do still inhabit the pond, and this is the third generation. The first beaver died, the second left, and we now have a third beaver or family of beaver. A muskrat has also been seen in the pond, as have a number of species of turtles (red-bellied, painted, snapping, red-eared), a black-crowned night hawk, ducks, blue and green herons, toads, bullfrogs, spring peepers, snakes, and other fauna. Mr. Zell noted that the recent addition of a walkway along one edge of the pond has not affected the wildlife there in any visible

Mr. Zell cleared up a lingering mystery for long-time Barcrofters: how did the pond develop, and why is it called Sparrow Swamp? Susan Christopher remembers when her father owned the land there and sent her down with her brothers to muck out the drain occasionally in the spring. They would have great fun crawling in the pipe under the railroad tracks (now the bike trail). Mr. Zell said the pond was begun by a beaver and helped along by an Eagle Scout when it threatened to wash out the northern end. The resident beavers have kept things up since then. Mr. Zell chose the name Sparrow Swamp for the songbirds that are numerous there. (The nature center runs a "Warbler Hike" and other bird-watching hikes in the Four Mile Run valley.) For those not familiar with Sparrow Swamp, it is just above the spot where Grandma's Creek enters Four Mile Run, on the Abingdon Street side of the trail. (Now, who named Grandma's Creek?)

Mr. Zell made other interesting comments on toleration of all of nature's species. He noted that there are no poisonous snakes at present in our area of Arlington and made a case for snakes as good citizens, along with the raccoons, possums, squirrels, and other animals the nature center cares for when they are injured. He was hard-pressed to defend the place of the rat in our neighborhood, noting that they like to travel in the sewer system, eat almost anything, and are not indicative of bad housekeeping! He recommends the old-fashioned spring trap rather than poison if you want to eliminate a rat, since the poison can kill other animals and gets into the runoff water headed for the Chesapeake Bay.

Congratulations to those elected, and our thanks for the services of the retiring officers. Come to the 4th of July parade and meet all of the new and old officers.





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
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When I look out my door, one of the neighbors I am most likely to see strolling by is Mrs. Marcel Bloomquist of 3rd St. S.

Although she was born in California, Mrs. Bloomquist moved to Washington, D.C., as a child. While working downtown as a secretary, she met her husband, Rudolph, who was a postal carrier until his retirement. They were married and moved to Barcroft in 1939.

At that time, most of the houses were brand new, with some still being built. Most of the neighbors then were young couples, who soon produced quite a few children. Many of the women in the northwest corner of Barcroft were members of the K Klub, which has served over all these years as a source of support and lifelong friendships.

With sadness, I report that Mr. Bloomquist passed away on May 11, 1992, following a long illness.

Mr. Bloomquist was an avid gardener. As a new homeowner in 1939, he was excited to have the opportunity to landscape his own brand new yard. He planted the azaleas and dogwoods, which are more beautiful than ever today. He also enjoyed having a vegetable garden. Back in those days, the train was still running on what is now the paved W&OD trail. Mrs. Bloomquist says she never rode on the train and doubts that her husband ever did, but she says that Mr. Bloomquist loved the train. He especially enjoyed hearing the train whistle all the way over on 3rd St.!

Hats off to Mr. Bloomquist and other avid Barcroft gardeners who have planted and cared for all of the beautiful flowers and trees we so enjoy to this day. It takes a long time to grow a big, beautiful, full azalea bush, and there sure are a lot of them here in Barcroft. All of those homes, so spanking new in the '30s and '40s, haven't changed much from the outside. We more recent home purchasers now find that we want to renovate the inside, update the kitchens, perhaps put on additions and install central air conditioning. But all of us appreciate the trees, shrubs, flowers, and charming architectural variety of the homes in our neighborhood.

And Barcroft in 1992 has something that Barcroft in 1939 didn't have very many of neighbors who have lived here for a very long time!

Gypsy Moth Spraying Done for the Year

The County's annual spraying for gypsy moths will be finished before you read this. This year the spraying was based on egg mass counts done over the winter. Trees in the target areas were going to be defoliated by the gypsy moth caterpillars if no action had been taken.

A section of Barcroft was sprayed from Arlington Boulevard down to about 3rd or 4th Street, spreading over into Arlington Forest. The County used BT, the "safest" spray, which is supposed to be completely nontoxic to humans and only affects gypsy moth caterpillars, shellfish, and some other molting species.



Tent caterpillars are also appearing in some places in the neighborhood. When you see one of the triangular "tent" webs, you must remove it immediately. If you are lucky, you will catch the hungry caterpillars in it, preventing them from damaging your tree.




Police Strengthening Neighborhood Program
