Future of Education: September's Meeting

The focus of September's BSCL meeting was a discussion of the Future Planning Committee's report on the future of education in Arlington. The report presents several proposed courses of action, many of which involve changes in the mix of neighborhood and alternative schools. Miriam Hughey-Guy, the new principal of Barcroft Elementary School, represented the County. Dawn Phillips represented Friends of Neighborhood Schools, which is a grass-roots group. Ms. Hughey-Guy described how and why the structure of Arlington's public schools is being reviewed. She said the main factor behind the plan was the need to accommodate growth in the school population. Ms.

Burglaries in Arlington Forest

The Arlington County Police report that the Arlington Forest neighborhood to our west and north is being plagued by burglaries.

Since August 19 there have been at least five burglaries and one attempted burglary in the Arlington Forest area. A number of the incidents have been close to Lubber Run Park. They have occurred during daylight hours. Entry has been obtained by smashing rear doors and breaking windows. In four cases nothing was taken. In the other cases stereo equipment, a television, and money were taken. The suspect in the case is described as follows:

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Margaret Kirk Departs Barcroft

On August 30 Barcroft bid farewell to longtime resident Margaret Kirk. She was so fond of the area, however, that she only moved across the highway to Culpepper Gardens.

Margaret moved here from Georgetown in 1935 with her husband, John, and one-year-old Joan—when our block of 4th St. was a dirt road with 10 houses. Later three sons were born and a second story was added to the house.

All of the children attended Barcroft School when there was only one class for each grade. Joan and John went to Washington-Lee High School (with Shirley MacLaine and Warren Beatty), at that time Arlington's only high

school. Twins Ronald and Donald were in Wakefield's first graduating class.

In the thirties and forties Arlington was an outer suburb. The Kirks raised chickens and grew and canned their own vegetables. John took his sons to the woods east of Taylor St. to hunt rabbits and squirrels. Where cars now rumble on George Mason Dr., there was a footpath to the girl's school at Arlington Hall. Our newer homes occupy land that the Kirks remember as gardens and cornfields.

John died in 1981, but some of us remember his talent for growing things. He started from cuttings with many different kinds of azaleas and sold lots of juicy tomatoes, at two pounds for a dollar, from his carport.

Margaret's departure leaves only three families who have lived on our block for more than 50 years. The Kirks are a living part of Barcroft history.

Fall Real Estate Roundup

In mid-September, the following homes were for sale around Barcroft. Asking prices are noted if the agent or owner returned our call. By the time you read this, some may already have gone to the highest bidder.

- Six build-to-order lots at S. Taylor and 4th St. The white home on the corner will be demolished, and six new ones will be built. There is no opportunity for neighborhood comment on this by-right development in accordance with existing zoning.
- A brick colonial with swimming pool at 133 S. Abingdon. Is this Barcroft's only swimming pool?
- Two brick townhouses on Arlington Boulevard (4600 block). Priced at \$289,900 and \$319,500. The higher one has 2800 square feet of living space and two sheds.
- A much-renovated brick colonial at 4400 lst St., priced at \$335,000.
- Howard Mumford's brick colonial at 4411 1st Pl., \$220,900. Howard was active in the BSCL for many years, was a member of the Board of Directors, and recently moved to a retirement community near Williamsburg.
- A brick townhouse on Pershing Ct.
- A shingle house at 4645 3rd St.
- Two new houses to be built by Kirkbride Construction at 4416 and 4420 8th St. They will be frame farmhouse-style homes with three or four bedrooms, priced "in the upper \$300,000s" and ready before the end of the year. Contrary to a rumor spread by the *Barcroft News*, Dee and Michael are still living here and building houses in Barcroft.
- Three new houses to be built by Ken Sylvestri on 8th St. between Wakefield and Buchanan on the former O'Hara homestead. (The old house, built by B.F. Perrow

- around the turn of the century, was demolished in a single day in September.) The new homes will be four-bedroom cedarshingle Victorians with porches and columns in the front, priced at \$399,000, and ready early next year.
- A brick contemporary next to the Community House at 4801 8th Rd., \$169,900. We're losing Craig Crutchfield and Carina Olsson.
- Bill and Sue Peine's brick colonial at 824 S. Wakefield, \$245,000. Bill and Sue were active in the neighborhood, and he was president of the BSCL in the mid-1980s. We will miss them
- Chris Monek's brick colonial at 806 S. Stafford, priced at \$393,900. We will miss Chris. Unfortunately, the Monek's need more space.



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Crime Resistance Committee Report

In September I reported to the BSCL meeting on the busy summer activities of the Crime Resistance Committee. The Committee and BSCL President Scott Allard met in early July and maintained continuous contact by phone and fax throughout the summer. We prepared a letter that Scott sent to Arlington County Circuit Court Judge William T. Newman for his consideration in the July sentencing of the Hi-Cue Billiard owners and operators on gambling and related violations at the establishment. The letter related the community's concerns and its efforts to seek constructive solutions to the ongoing pattern of problems at Hi-Cue. The letter asked the court "to impose a sentence on the defendants which is designed to have a constructive impact on the relationship between the defendant-owners and the community. It is the desire of the community that all business establishments be operated in a 'good neighbor' fashion." On July 16 the defendants were each sentenced to serve 60 days and pay a \$10,000 fine. While the sentences are on appeal the Committee will continue to monitor developments. Copies of the BSCL letter are available from Scott Allard or me (920-1287).

The Committee met in August to make plans for fall activities. These include meeting with the Columbia Pike Revitalization Organization (CPRO) to address the large problems along our end of Columbia Pike and to establish a working relationship with Corporal Ed Chapman, who has been named as the neighborhood's primary contact with the Arlington County Police and who will be at our November meeting to meet members of the community.

Joint BSCL-Sierra Club Park Cleanup October 16

Last fall the BSCL voted to participate in Arlington County's Adopt-A-Park Program by helping keep the area north of Columbia Pike and the W&rOD Bike Trail clean. About three summers ago we did some major brush and tree clearing there with the support of Arlington County Parks and the Arlington Police. There have been several subsequent cleanups as well as related efforts such as moving the recycling center to the south side of Columbia Pike.

If you've noticed the trash in the area and have wished something would be done, here's your chance! The BSCL's next cleanup of the area north of Columbia Pike at the W&OD Bike Trail is scheduled for 9–11 AM, October 16. Gloves and heavy shoes are advised.

The Sierra Club will also be conducting a cleanup in the Four Mile Run streambed between the Bike Trail and the Safeway at the same time, so this is a chance to meet Sierra Club locals and/or walk the streambed with a bunch of other concerned people. Hope to see you there!
